The last concerted stand of the minority was made upon my resolution introduced immediately following the call to order on the last day of the session. This resolution provided for immediate adjournment without transacting any other business than the formal procedure of validating acts theretofore passed by formal and final adjournment. Losing Fight Made. Every one recognized that if a one-third vote could be held in support of the resolution before the Republican caucus could be held that this one-third would stand united in support of every veto. We lost by a score of 35 to 14, thus making it apparent that further attempt at concerted opposition was hopeless. Considering the fact that had the necessary one-third voted against indefinite postponement of the resolution it would have meant the sustaining of every veto and a consequent distinct Democratic victory no Republican should be blamed for his refusal to cooperate.
