

WOLGAST BOUT WITH MURPHY SET FOR APRIL 19

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 18.

—Before leaving with his manager, Tom Jones, today for Harbin Springs where he intends to whip himself into condition for his match here with Harlan Tommy Murphy, Ad Wolgast, former lightweight champion of the world, asked Promoter Coffroth to postpone the bout from April 12 to April 19 because of an injury to the little finger.

While returning to San Francisco from Medford, Ore., a car window unexpectedly descended and, catching Ad's little finger, jammed it so hard that he has lost practically all of the nail. A physician advised him to ask for a postponement.

Promoter Coffroth has not yet given his consent to the postponement, but it is believed that he will. He has telegraphed Murphy regarding the April 19 date and, as the stork is hovering over the Harlan harp's home, it is believed he will readily agree.

Manager Jones is responsible today for the assertion that if Wolgast loses to Murphy he will retire from the ring for good.

"If Wolgast wins," said Jones, "he will go right ahead taking on all comers; but if he loses he will know that his ring days are over."

Wolgast, however, is just as confident of his ability as a fighter as ever.

"I don't suppose," he said, "that the Southern Pacific owns enough locomotives to pull Joe Rivers into another match with me. But there is nothing I would like better than to tackle Joe again. I know and he knows that I can lick him. As to Ritchie, he does not want any more of my game either."
