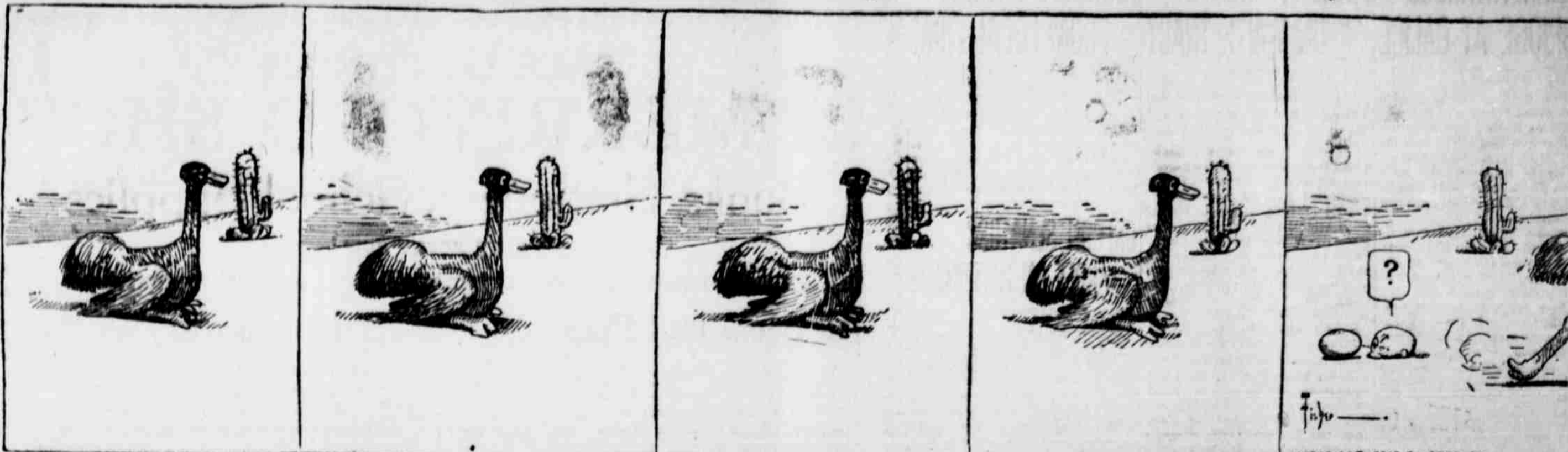

RESOLUTION

Be It Resolved by the City Council of the City of Medford: That that certain resolution heretofore passed on the 24 day of September, 1912, by the City Council of the City of Medford, at a regular meeting, said resolution declaring the intention of the Council to cease Cottage street from East Main street to the center line of Taylor street is said city to be improved by placing on both sides of said street concrete curb and gutter and by paving the same for a width of twenty-five feet with asphalt paving consisting of a three inch asphaltic concrete base and a one inch asphaltic wearing surface, all in accordance with the general specifications prepared by the city engineer of said city, and with additional specifications submitted by the Clark & Henry Construction company, both of which general and additional specifications are on file in the office of the city recorder of said city, and assess the cost thereof on the property adjacent to said improvement; and that certain resolution heretofore passed on the 17th day of September, 1912, by the City Council of the City of Medford, at a regular meeting, ordering that Cottage street from East Main street to the center line of Taylor street be improved by placing concrete curbs and gutters on both sides thereof and paving the same with asphalt pavement, consisting of a three inch asphaltic concrete base and a one inch asphaltic wearing surface, be, and the same hereby are rescinded and repealed.
