

## REAMES NAMED AS U. S. ATTORNEY ASSERTS REPORT

WASHINGTON, Apr. 5.—Although no official announcement has been made, it seemed assured today that the recommendations of Senators Chamberlain and Lane for federal offices in Oregon include Clarence L. Reames of Medford for United States District Attorney. Among those in the know it was considered that Reames was a sure shot for this position.

Clarence L. Reames received a telegram this morning stating that the Oregon Journal has received a despatch from Washington to the effect that he will be appointed United States District Attorney for Oregon. According to the telegram other appointments to be made are as follows: John Montag, United States marshal; Milton Miller, internal revenue collector; Judge Burke, collector of customs; Ed Weathers, appraiser of customs; Frank Myers, postmaster at Portland.

Mr. Reames is a native son of Jackson county and served as the joint representative of Douglas and Jackson counties during the recent session of the legislature. His candidacy for the place was conducted quietly as he protested that he was not a candidate.

Mr. Reames' selection is probably responsible for the appointment of John Montag as United States marshal instead of W. H. Canon of this city who was a candidate. One appointment only could be given to southern Oregon.

## FREE SPEECH FIGHT WON BY HAYWOOD

PATERSON, N. J., April 5.—The right to exercise free speech in peaceful assembly was established here today by Justice Minturn of the state supreme court when he freed William D. Haywood and Adolph Lestig, labor leaders, sentenced to six months' imprisonment for their activities in connection with the strike of silk workers here.

Thousands of strikers gathered on the streets about the courtroom and cheered the decision of Justice Minturn.

## BUD RETURNS TO TRAIN FOR BATTLE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 5.—Bud Anderson is back in Los Angeles today after a 10 days' rest at Wheeler Springs, and Tuesday he will begin training in earnest for his scheduled 20-round match April 15 with Knockout Brown.

Anderson spent his time at the springs tramping the streams with a fishing rod and climbing the mountain trails. He claims to weigh just 140 pounds, and appears to be in perfect condition.
