NEW YORK, April 9.—At the end of 10 rounds of furious fighting here last night between Joe Rivers of Los Angeles and Leach Cross, the Brooklyn fighting dentist, the popular opinion was that Rivers had a shade on the New Yorker.

The only incident in the 10 rounds which had any semblance of knock-down was in the third round, when Rivers tripped over Cross' foot and hit the floor. He was up in an instant, however, and evened the round. Rivers had the best of four rounds, three were in favor of Cross and three were even.

Cook became enraged and issued a blanket challenge to all who did not believe in his statement that he had reached the North Pole to fistie combat. No acceptances of the challenge have been registered to date.

ASK BRYAN TO SECURE ALIMONY FOR PRINCESS OLGA

WASHINGTON, April 9.—A personal plea to Secretary of State Bryan to aid her to compel her husband to provide for her support was made today by Princess Olga Hassan, formerly Miss Olga Humphreys of Oakland, Cal., wife of a cousin of the Khedive of Egypt. The couple were married in Paris two years ago, Prince Hassan deserted his bride a few minutes after the ceremony.

Up to date the prince has refused to make any settlement of his wife, who says she is willing to renounce her title upon the payment of \$250,000.

ANOTHER POACHER CLEARED BY GRANTS PASS JURY

GRANTS PASS, April 9.—Jim Lewis was on trial in Justice Holman's court Tuesday forenoon on a charge of having deer meat in his possession during the closed season. He demanded a trial by jury, and a verdict of not guilty was brought after the jury had been out about twenty minutes. Lewis has been living at the Greenback mine, and the complaint alleged that the venison was in his possession during February. A deputy game warden was the complaining witness.

30,000 FANS TO SEE BROOKLYN VS. PHILLIES

NEW YORK, April 9.—Thirty thousand fans and fannettes are expected to gather this afternoon in the new \$750,000 dollar baseball park at Ebbets' Field, Brooklyn, to witness the opening game of the National League season between Brooklyn and Philadelphia. The opening day was set forward by special dispensation of the National commission, so that the American League opening here tomorrow might not conflict with the dedication of the park.

GALLOWAY PROMOTED HEADS SEATTLE HOUSE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 9.—A. B. Galloway, assistant manager of the Blake-McFall company in Portland has today received the appointment of general manager of the Seattle branch of the Blake-McFall interests. The company there is known as the American Paper company. Galloway will take charge May 1.

Mr. Galloway is a former Medford boy, having spent his youth and early manhood here.

SONORA REBLES RENEW ATTACK ON OJEDA'S ARMY

NACO, Ariz., April 9.—The Sonora constitutionalists renewed their attack today on the federal garrisons at Naco, Sonora, firing from the east and west sides of the town with machine guns. The defenders replied with heavy artillery.

During the first exchange today two federal officers were killed and four wounded.

General Pedro Ojeda, commanding the Naco garrison, has appealed to

the commander of the United States cavalry detachment policing the border for permission to give military burial on the American side to twenty-two of the American side to 22 federal soldiers. This would indicate that the federal casualties during yesterday's fighting were heavier than reported.

BOSTON HELLO GIRLS PLAN GENERAL STRIKE

BOSTON, Mass., April 9.—Two thousand telephone girls are prepared to strike here today unless their demands for better wages and hours are met. The company is trying to muster strikebreakers, indicating that the demands will not be granted.
