DENVER POLICE PUT I. W. W. IN BULL PEN

DENVER, Colo., April 15.—After declaring they would "show up the Denver police," sixty-six members of the Industrial Workers of the World are in the bullpen on a bread and water diet here today. The Industrialists declare they will fill the jails unless they are allowed to speak in the streets. Chief of Police O'Neill ordered all persons speaking without permit arrested at once. Sixty-six were arrested in Englewood and Petersburg, suburbs, last night and brought here. Thirty others escaped the officials and it is believed they are still in the city. The Industrialists will be arraigned this afternoon. It has not yet been decided what action will be taken to force the men to leave town.

HOBOKEN VOTES UPON COMMISSION FORM

HOBOKEN, N. J., April 15.—Fought by the democratic "machine" Hoboken voters today are balloting upon the commission form of government, as are the men of Jersey City, Bayonne and Union Hill. Petitions calling for the elections were filed some weeks ago, more than the prescribed number of signatures having been secured. There is little contest in Jersey City, except from the socialists, who declare the plan means more centralization of power. County Judge Robert Carey, who helped draft the enabling act, predicts overwhelming victory for the commission form today in the four cities.

PUGET SOUND IMPORTS SHOW LARGE INCREASE

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., April 15. Reports just completed by the customs department show imports at Puget Sound district for the first quarter of 1913 to have reached a total of \$12,931,627, an increase of \$3,600,492 over the same quarter last year. Exports for the quarter are \$15,018,472. The collections for the quarter amount to \$463,558, an increase of \$58,221 over last year. Of this amount Seattle contributed \$327,080 and Tacoma \$136,478.

WAPPENSTEIN A TRUSTY WALLA WALLA PRISON

Wappenstein, former chief of police of Seattle, who is serving a sentence in the state penitentiary here for bribery, has been given today a trusty position and placed in charge of the chicken yard at the institution. MOUNT MCKINLEY EXPEDITION REACHES KANTISHA DISTRICT

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 15.—Word that the Mount McKinley expedition under Arch Deacon Hudson Stuck has reached the Kantisha district near the base of the peak, was brought here today by Dan Keller, a miner from Eureka Creek. Keller says Stuck encountered good trails and made better time than any other party.

SEATTLE CHAMBER OPPOSES ALIEN LAW

SEATTLE, Wash., April 15.—Answering messages received from Chambers in San Diego and San Francisco, the local chamber of commerce sent the following message, concerning the alien land bill now before the California legislature: "This chamber has always insisted that legislation relating to aliens should apply to all nationalities alike. We believe enactment by any coast state of laws discriminating against any nationality will be greatly embarrassing to commercial relations with people of countries effected, impairing volume of business for the entire country and subjecting to severe strain all international relations."
