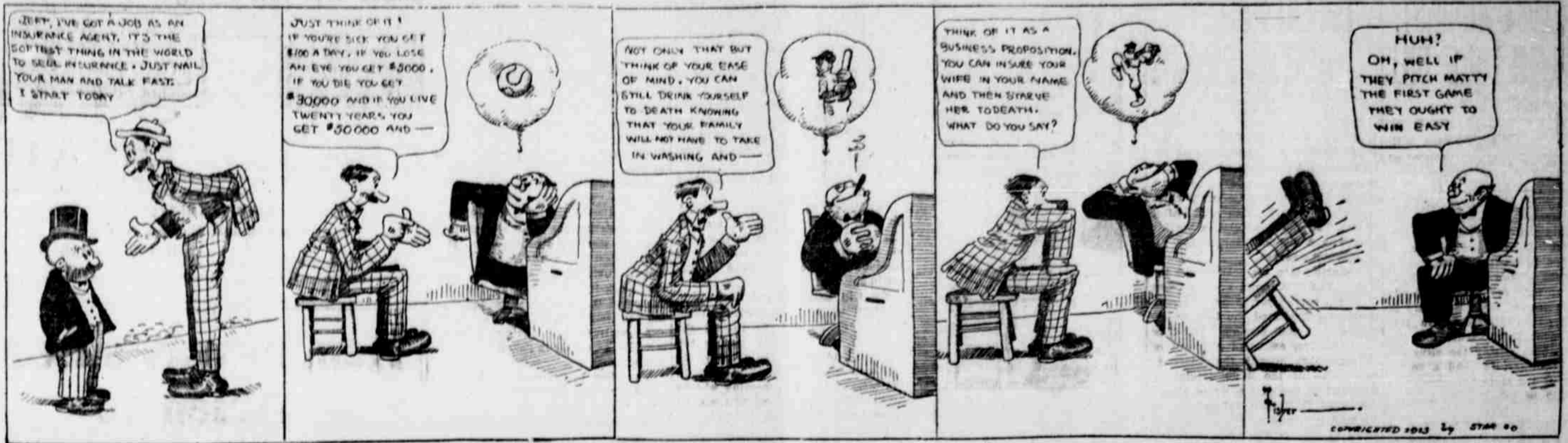


Mutt Forgot That the Baseball Season Opens Today

SACRIFICED HONOR AND THEN HERSELF

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 16.—Having sacrificed all in a vain effort to save the life of her invalid husband, Lou Downing brooded over her loss and fired a bullet through her brain and is dead here today.

The finding of a note beside her body revealed the tragedy of her life.

The note said that her true name was Mrs. J. L. Elam, and gave instructions to keep information of the life she had lead secret from her parents in Iowa.

Letters in the cabin revealed that when she married Elam he was in good health and able to care for her, but that later he was taken ill. When their money was gone and he was no better she sold herself for funds to secure proper care for him. Realizing that she could not keep him from knowing what she had done, she told him she had secured employment in Alaska. Elam grew worse and on January 31 he died in Los Angeles. The letter telling of his death did not reach her until late in March.

Several times since she has threatened to end her life.
