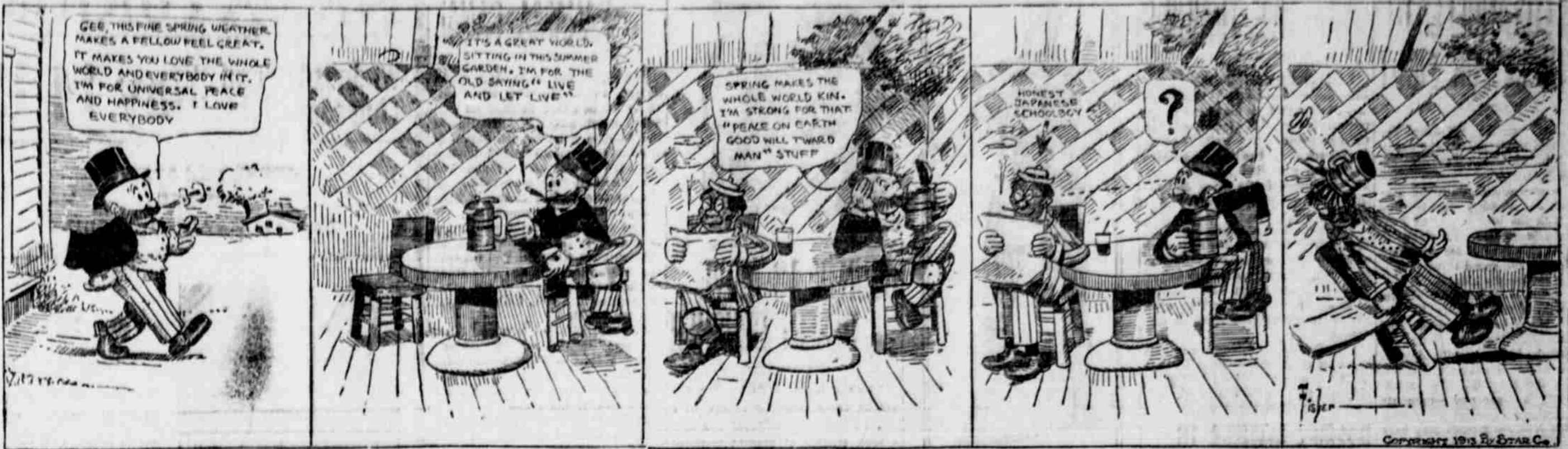


Jeff's from California and Can Prove It

SUIT TO QUIET TITLE. SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Jackson. John A. Torney, plaintiff, vs. John W. Cox and Myra Cox, his wife, D. T.
