

KENTNER CHARGED WITH EMBEZZLING \$13,000; ARRESTED

A complaint charging H. C. Kentner, manager of the H. C. Kentner company of this city, with embezzlement has been sworn to by F. E. Merrick, one of the principal stock holders of the company, Kentner has been placed under arrest but allowed to go on his own recognizance. The complaint charges the specific embezzlement of \$40 on the third day of March, 1913, but it is reported that his shortage will total nearly \$13,000. A preliminary hearing will be held before Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor Monday. A. E. Reames has been retained by the defense while Prosecutor E. E. Kelly will appear for the state.

The Complaint.
The complaint as filed in the justice court reads as follows:
In the justice court of the state of Oregon, for Medford district, Jackson county.

State of Oregon, plaintiff, vs. H. C. Kentner, defendant.
Criminal complaint.
State of Oregon, county of Jackson—SS.

F. E. Merrick under oath accuses H. C. Kentner by this complaint of the crime of embezzlement committed as follows, to-wit:

That the said H. C. Kentner on the third day of March, 1913, in the county of Jackson and state of Oregon, then and there being and then and there being a trusted employee, to-wit: The manager of the H. C. Kentner company, an Oregon corporation, and by virtue of such employment and entrustment then and there having the custody, possession and control of the moneys, funds, goods and chattels of the said H. C. Kentner company, did then and there unlawfully and feloniously take, steal and carry away with the intent then and there to embezzle and appropriate to his own use the sum of \$40, lawful money of the United States, the particular denomination of said money being to this complainant unknown, out of the moneys and funds of the said H. C. Kentner company, against the statute in such case made and provided and against the peace and dignity of the state of Oregon.

Total Amount \$13,000

The total amount of goods and cash belonging to the corporation which Kentner is said to have embezzled is more than \$13,000 according to reports. It is said that he is short this amount over and above a salary of \$300 a month which he drew when he was only supposed to draw \$175. It is also reported that Walter Kentner, his son, who is associated with him, has overdrawn his salary account \$1500, but that this is due to the father, not the son. The \$13,000 shortage is said to range over a long period of time and consisted mostly of cash, although a certain amount of goods are charged. Kentner's personal account will probably be shown at the hearing Monday.

Merrick Hit Hard.
Friends of F. E. Merrick state that Kentner's shortage at the store and his career with other transactions has hit him hard. He was on considerable of Kentner's paper and it is reported that Kentner is hopelessly involved.

The H. C. Kentner company has been in financial straits for some time past. Recently F. K. Deuel took over the business retaining Kentner as manager. The firm was formerly Deuel & Kentner, Deuel retiring a few years ago. While the store was several times reported on the rocks it was always believed due to mismanagement in overbuying.

Mr. Kentner today stated that he had no fear of the outcome, stating that his arrest simply followed involved business dealings. A report that he refused to answer telephone calls was due to the serious illness of his son, the telephone bell being quieted. He and his friends believe that the matter will be straightened out without trouble.
