WATERFRONT STRIKE THREATENS NEW YORK

PHILADELPHIA, May 20.—Threat to spread the waterfront strike here to the port of New York and eventually to all Atlantic coast points were voiced here today by leaders of the Industrial Workers of the World. More than 3000 men, who demand thirty-five cents an hour for ten hours work, time and a half for work after six p. m., double time for work on Sundays and holidays and recognition of the union, are out here.

ORDINANCE NO. 747.

An ordinance cancelling and repealing Ordinance No. 721, being an ordinance granting certain franchises and privileges unto M. T. Minney, his heirs and assigns, for the construction, operation and maintenance of a railway in the city of Medford.

Whereas, heretofore and on the 13th day of January, 1913, the Common Council of the City of Medford granted certain franchises, rights and privileges unto M. T. Minney, his heirs and assigns, by Ordinance No. 721, and

Whereas, said ordinance was amended by Ordinance No. 728 on the 19th day of April, 1913; and

Whereas, by sundry amendments now presented to the said Common Council of the City of Medford, and filed herewith, the said franchise rights and privileges are vested in Spencer S. Bullis, and he appearing hereto and consenting to the repeal thereof, upon consideration of the granting by this Common Council of new franchises, privileges and rights to him by Ordinance No. 748.

The City of Medford doth ordain as follows: Section 1. That Ordinance No. 721 amended by Ordinance No. 728 be, and the same hereby is, repealed, annulled, revoked and canceled, and the City Treasurer of the City of Medford is hereby authorized and instructed to deliver back to M. T. Minney, his heirs and assigns, the certain certified check in the amount of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00) deposited upon acceptance of said franchise and that all rights and privileges, franchise rights, duties and obligations, granted or imposed by Ordinance No. 721, as amended by Ordinance No. 728, be canceled, revoked, annulled and discharged.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon, the 16th day of May, 1913, by the following vote: Mitchell, aye; Campbell, aye; Sumnerville, aye; Porter, aye; Stewart, aye; and Miller, aye.
