

\$100,000 IN TIPS SPENT IN WEEK AT BERLIN HOTELS

BERLIN, May 24.—A small fortune has been given as "tips" to the bellboys, waiters, porters, chambermaids and other functionaries by the guests at the six leading hotels in Berlin in the last few days.

That Americans enjoy an unequal and undesired reputation as the most generous "tippers" in the world was the statement made at several of the hotels today.

"Americans come only third as 'tippers,'" declared General Manager Kretschmar of the big Adlon hotel. "The Russians head the list. They are the most generous in the number and size of 'tips' given in the hotels. Contrary to general report, which places them near the bottom, Germans come second in 'tipping.' While the amount of individual tips they give is not always as large as those of the Americans, they know how to tip, never forget any one and the aggregate of a German's tips is larger than that of the American."

"English come fourth, or average up about with the Americans. The Englishmen from London and Manchester tip freely, but the Scotch—the Scotchman—well," said the hotel proprietor with a smile. "He lives up to his reputation. He doesn't tip at all. He is what I believe the English-speaking waiters say is called a 'tightwad' in your country."

Manager Kretschmar ought to know. Nearly all the rich and prominent Americans stop at his hostelry. Just now he has an entire floor of Russians and a good part of the suite of King George, including several Scotchmen, are at the Adlon.
