ONE WAY OF GRAFTING IS ELIMINATED

Supreme Court Holds Manufacturers of Patented Goods Cannot Fix Arbitrary Prices—Dealers May Cut Prices at Will.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Freeing the public to a great extent from paying extortionate charges for patented articles, the United States supreme court today sapped the strength of patent monopolies by holding that patentees have no right to fix arbitrary retail prices for their produce.

COAST RAILROAD PROJECTORS BUSY

Dr. J. F. Reddy returned to Grants Pass Sunday having arrived Saturday from Crescent City. He is confident that the Pacific Interior railroad to Crescent City has been successfully planned although it will be necessary to hold another election to validate the bonds issued by the city of Grants Pass.

Legal technicalities to please the bond buyers, must be complied with to satisfy the purchasers, states Dr. Reddy, "but the syndicate we are negotiating with will in all probability build the road. Some \$25,000 in city warrants, have been sent for the syndicate to cash, to be replaced by bonds, and if this money is forthcoming it will make a total of \$35,000 the syndicate has so far invested as an earnest of good intentions."

WEEK-END RATES FROM PORTLAND TO MEDFORD
