ORDINANCE No. 755 An ordinance assessing the property adjacent to and benefited by the eight-inch lateral sewer constructed on Oak street from a point 150 feet north of Second street to

Knicht street, for the cost of constructing the same and providing the means of carrying said assessment into full effect. The city of Medford doth ordain as follows: Section 1. Whereas, the city council did heretofore provide by ordinance for the serving of the owners of property adjacent to and benefited by the construction of the lateral sewer hereinafter described, to appear before said council and show cause, if any, why said property should not be assessed for the construction of said sewer, and did fix a time for hearing any such protests, which notice was given in accordance with said ordinance more than ten days before the beginning of the construction of said sewer, but no protests against said construction or assessment of the cost thereof was made by anyone and said sewer was by said council ordered constructed. And whereas, the cost of the construction of said sewer has been made and hereby is determined to be the sum of \$567.75. Now therefore, said city doth ordain and declare that each parcel of property described below is adjacent to and benefited by that certain lateral sewer eight inches in size, constructed on Oak street from a point 150 feet north of Second street to Knicht street, and that the proportion of the cost of said sewer which each said parcel of land is to bear, based on the benefits derived respectively by said several tracts of land, is the amount set opposite the description of each parcel below, and that each of said parcels is actually benefited in the amount set opposite its description below by the construction of said sewer, and that said several amounts represent the proportional benefits of said several parcels from said sewer. And each of said parcels is hereby assessed the amount set opposite its description below for the construction of said sewer, the name appearing above each description being the name of the owner, or reputed owner, of each such lot or parcel. Assessment for an eight-inch lateral sewer on Oak street from a point 150 feet north of Second street to Knicht street, Medford, Ore. Assessment No. 1—Medford Lumber company. Lot 1, block 2, Anderson-Toft addition to the city of Medford, Oregon, frontage 26 feet on the east side of Oak street, as described in volume 96, page 392, of the county recorder's records of Jackson county, Oregon. 26 feet, rate per foot 75c, \$19.50. Assessment No. 2—E. S. Hitzler. Lot 6, block 2, Anderson-Toft addition to the city of Medford, Oregon; frontage 126 feet on the east side of Oak street, as described in volume 76, page 649, of the county recorder's records of Jackson county, Oregon. 126 feet, rate per foot 75c, \$94.50. Assessment No. 3—Minnie W. Bender. Lot 1, block 3, Anderson-Toft addition to the city of Medford, Oregon; frontage 126 feet on the east side of Oak street, as described in volume 75, page 56, of the county recorder's records of Jackson county, Oregon. 126 feet, rate per foot 75c, \$94.50. Assessment No. 4—John Roter. A parcel of land being the south 100.3 feet of a parcel of land, designated as "K" on the official plat of the city of Medford; fronting 109.3 feet on the west side of Oak street, as described in volume 96, page 558, of the county recorder's records of Jackson county, Oregon. 109.3 feet, rate per foot 75c, \$81.98. Assessment No. 5—Myrtle Gardiner. As a parcel of land, being the north 68 feet of a parcel of land designated as "K" on the official plat of the city of Medford, fronting 68 feet on the west side of Oak street, as described in volume 92, page 592, of the county recorder's records of Jackson county, Oregon. 68 feet, rate per foot 75c, \$51. Assessment No. 6—Marel Sullivan. A parcel of land, designated as "J" on the official plat of the city of Medford, fronting 127 feet on the west side of Oak street, as described in volume 46, page 699, of the county recorder's records of Jackson county, Oregon. 127 feet, rate per foot 75c, \$95.25. Assessment No. 7—Marel Sullivan. Lot 4, block 2, King's addition to the city of Medford, Oregon, frontage 126 feet on the west side of Oak street, as described in volume 46, page 699, of the county recorder's records of Jackson county, Oregon. 126 feet, rate per foot 75c, \$94.50. Assessment No. 8—A. S. Kleinhammer. Lot 5, block 1, King's addition to the city of Medford, Oregon, fronting on the northwest corner of Knicht and Oak streets, as described in volume 92, page 271, of the county recorder's records of Jackson county, Oregon. 58 feet, rate per foot 75c, \$43.50. Section 2. And it is hereby ordered and ordained that said several assessments and the liens thereon entered in the lien docket of said city, and that thereupon notice be given to the owners or reputed owners of said property, and that the same be enforced and collected in the manner provided by the charter of said city for the collection of assessments for the improvements of streets therein. Section 3. It is further ordered that the notice above provided for be published one time in a newspaper published and of general circulation in said city, and the lien thereon provided by ordinance No. — of said city.
