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CHANGING NAME OF GRANTS PASS CRESCENT CITY LINE

(Grants Pass Courier.)

Dr. Reddy and Chief Engineer Harmon left for Portland Thursday night to meet San Francisco parties there and complete the Oregon state organization of the company that is preparing for the construction of the railroad from Grants Pass to the sea. The incorporation papers will be filed at once, it being necessary that separate incorporation be provided for each California and Oregon. It being an Interstate railway.

To denote the broader lines upon which the new corporation proposes to operate, the name of the new company will be changed from that of the Grants Pass & Crescent City ss it has been called thus far in the negotiations, to the California, Oregon & Eastern, this name coming from the fact that the line originates in the two coast states, and that it is reaching eastward, where it will ultimately connect with transcontinental lines.

Mayor Smith, at the instance of Mr. Helm and the California people, has been looking at different available suites of office rooms for engagement for the new company when it opens headquarters here as it intends in the near future.

Railroad matters are progressing as rapidly as is possible with the great amount of detail to develop and manage, all the interested parties bending their best energies to bring the organization to a point where actual construction can commence at the earliest possible date.
