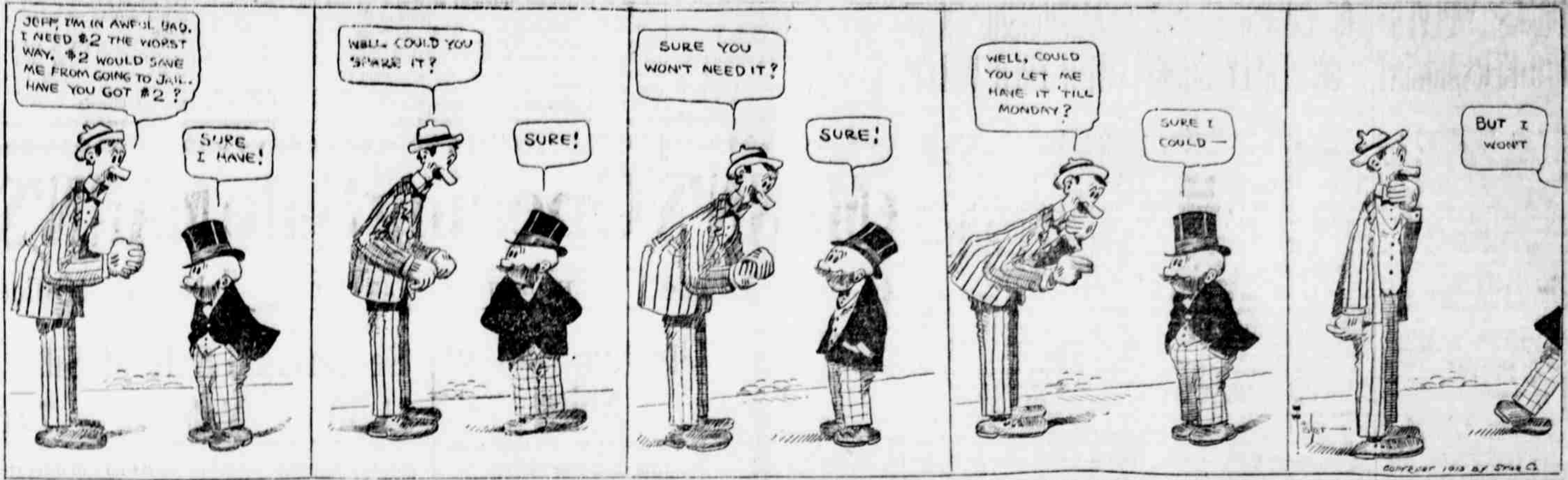

## NIGHTHAWK WINS ST. LEGER STAKE

DONCASTER, Pa., Sept. 10.—Nighthawk, owned by E. H. Walter, captured the St. Leger stake, worth \$20,000 to the winner, here today. The race was the last of the season's classic three-year-old events, over the mile and three-quarter course on the historic Town Moor. Nighthawk was a 50 to 1 shot. White Magic, at 33 to 1, was second, and Sermond, owned by Sir Berkeley Sheffield at the same odds, was third.  
The race was worth \$1500 to the second horse and \$500 to the third. Colts carried 126 pounds and fillies 123.  
King George scratched his entries and there were no American horses in the race. After Day Comet had been scratched there were 12 starters in the race.
