Matty Takes Control In the third inning Doyle's fumble and Merkle's delay in running down Murphy, caught off third on Baker's easy grounder, cost two more runs. He worked a faultless game in the six closing rounds, but his batting support was too pitifully weak against Plank's great pitching, but twenty-nine Giants facing him. 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RECLAIM WEST'S ARID LAND LANE'S PLEA TO CONGRESS. WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—The government could expend profitably in ten years a hundred million dollars in the reclamation of arid, semi-arid and swamp lands located west of the Missouri river... Interior Franklin K. Lane today on his return from a tour of the west. "The lands once reclaimed could be divided into farms of twenty and forty acres, every one of which would be taken up promptly. This land is practical and necessarily must be reclaimed by the government because the reclamation projects generally have been failures except in small tracts. My purpose is to recommend to congress extensive irrigation and drainage projects."
