

EVERYONE MORE OR LESS CRIMINAL ASSERTS EXPERT

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 16.—If a criminal expert looked you over and studied you and rendered his decision declaring that you have many characteristics, attributes and habits of a criminal you'd probably "hit the nail," but according to a classification of criminals given today before the American Prison Congress it would appear that there are mighty few people but what have "criminal characteristics." Dr. Phelan, who spoke at the closing sessions of the congress today on "The Mental Factor in Crime," is surgeon of the Dominion Penitentiary at Kingston, Ontario. He has studied classification of criminals, and criminal tendencies specially and is noted as one of the most famous experts in the world along these lines. His classifications therefore should be intensely interesting. He enumerated nine classes as follows:

Criminal from adventure who started by reading "penny dreadful" novels—not necessarily bad—may be redeemed; criminal from weak mentality—not insane but whose mentality is not up to the normal—in this class belongs degenerates—when aroused are dangerous—will murder for slight gain; insane criminal who has irresistible impulses to commit atrociously anti-social acts; accidental criminal, or "criminal by passion"—generally a man of good reputation who, owing to peculiar sensitiveness attempts life or seeks revenge for insult to himself or anyone dear to him; inconvertible criminal—morally depraved or completely defeat of law and authority; habitual criminal—generally intelligent—forms fully 50 per cent of all prisoners—presents some form of mental aberration which accounts for anti-social acts—epileptics belong to this class—instability of character which easily is aggravated by trouble or worry—unless treated early, soon becomes habitual criminal; professional criminal who represents artifice of criminal world—little or no moral responsibility—bonafide—conceited—cunning—generally heartless and lacking in pity; instinctive criminal—moral monster devoid of social guiding instincts—sensual—selfish—brutal—commits crime for the love of it—incapable of reform.

BRITAIN LAUNCHES BIGGEST WARSHIP COSTING \$11,750,000

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Oct. 16.—The costliest, speediest, most powerful super-Dreadnought in the world, the "Queen Elizabeth," was launched at the royal dockyard here today, the naming ceremony being performed by Lady Meux, wife of Admiral Sir Hodsorth Meux, commander-in-chief of the Portsmouth naval station. The "Queen Elizabeth" and her four sister ships now under construction comprise the very latest word in battleship building. Each will cost when completed \$11,750,000, will have a speed of twenty-five knots an hour and will be provided with ten fifteen-inch guns capable of throwing a broadside fire of 15,000 pounds. They will burn no coal whatever, relying upon fuel entirely from oil which will be stored between the outer and inner skins. Each will carry more than a million gallons of oil. The guns will have an extreme range of 22 miles, and experts say they will be able to penetrate the thickest armor yet made at a range of 50 per cent greater than that at which any naval action is likely to be fought. The enormous advance in warship construction as represented by these vessels is indicated by the fact that the original Dreadnought, completed only seven years ago, had a broadside limit of only 6800 pounds. The big increase in both offensive and defensive armament was made possible by the substitution of oil for coal, which thus provided great economy in both weight and space.

WISCONSIN GOVERNOR VISITS SAN FRANCISCO

OAKLAND, Cal., Oct. 16.—Governor Francis E. McGovern of Wisconsin was the guest today of the Commercial club at the Hotel Oakland. The governor told in interviews of the prosperity of his state and remarked upon the splendid future in store for this vicinity. He was taken in an automobile to points of interest.

PREDICTS HUERTA WILL GO LIMIT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Prediction that Provisional President Huerta of Mexico would maintain his present dictatorship over the affairs of the country unless he is assassinated or forced to flee was voiced here today by Representative Hardin of Texas, following a visit to the White House.

"Huerta is a desperate man," said Hardin. "He is likely to take any measures to maintain his power and save his own life."

PACKEY M'FARLAND TO FIGHT TOMMY MURPHY

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—Packey McFarland today is en route to New York, where on Friday night he is to meet Harlem Tommy Murphy in a scheduled ten round bout. McFarland left in good condition and declared that Murphy "did not have a chance."

RITUAL MURDER TRIAL BOOMERANG TO JEW BAITERS

KIEFF, Oct. 16.—The prosecution finally found a witness today who stuck to the story that he told at the preliminary hearing against Mendel Bellis, charged with murdering twelve-year-old Andrei Muschinsky in connection with an alleged Jewish religious ceremony.

The witness was Ludmilla Cheberyak, a boy friend of Andrei, who testified that he saw Bellis kidnap the latter. He was contradicted immediately, however by Rudavik Nakonetchny, another boy friend.

The court procedure has amazed Anglo-Saxon witnesses of the trial, the various persons put on the stand rambling through all sorts of irrelevant stories and behaving very much as they pleased without objection from the bench. A detective named Politchuk, testifying today, even broke off long enough to smoke a cigarette, explaining that he felt faint and it would help him.

The case promises to prove a boomerang, as, instead of creating feeling against the Jews, it has convinced everyone that the government is persecuting them. Even if Bellis should be convicted, which may happen, under government pressure, despite the weakness of the prosecution's case, this feeling, Russians themselves said, is bound to give public opinion a turn in the Jews' favor.

Chisholm was elected moderator of the Southern Oregon Presbytery; Rev. Ward W. McHenry, moderator of the Grand Ronde Presbytery and Rev. W. S. Van Nuys was elected moderator of the Pendleton Presbytery.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Hope of finding Arthur J. Jewell, the missing aviator, alive was practically abandoned today. No trace of Jewell or

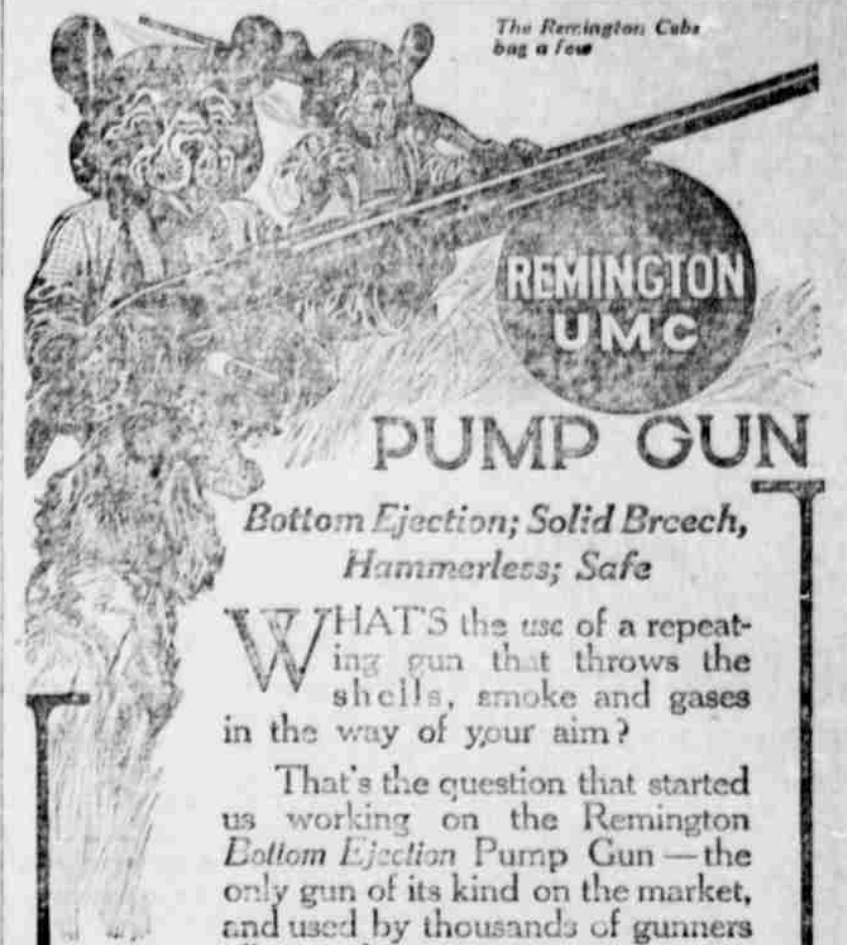
