TO THE VOTERS OF MEDFORD.

In accordance with the provisions of the new registration law passed at the last session of the Oregon legislature, every elector of a municipality, where the county precincts are not co-extensive with the city wards, (as is the case in Medford) must register with the city recorder. It will therefore be necessary for everyone desiring to vote at the next city election in January, to register at the recorder's office in the city hall, not later than December 13th, 1913. Registration books are now open and every voter in the city should bring two free holders of the county for witnesses.
