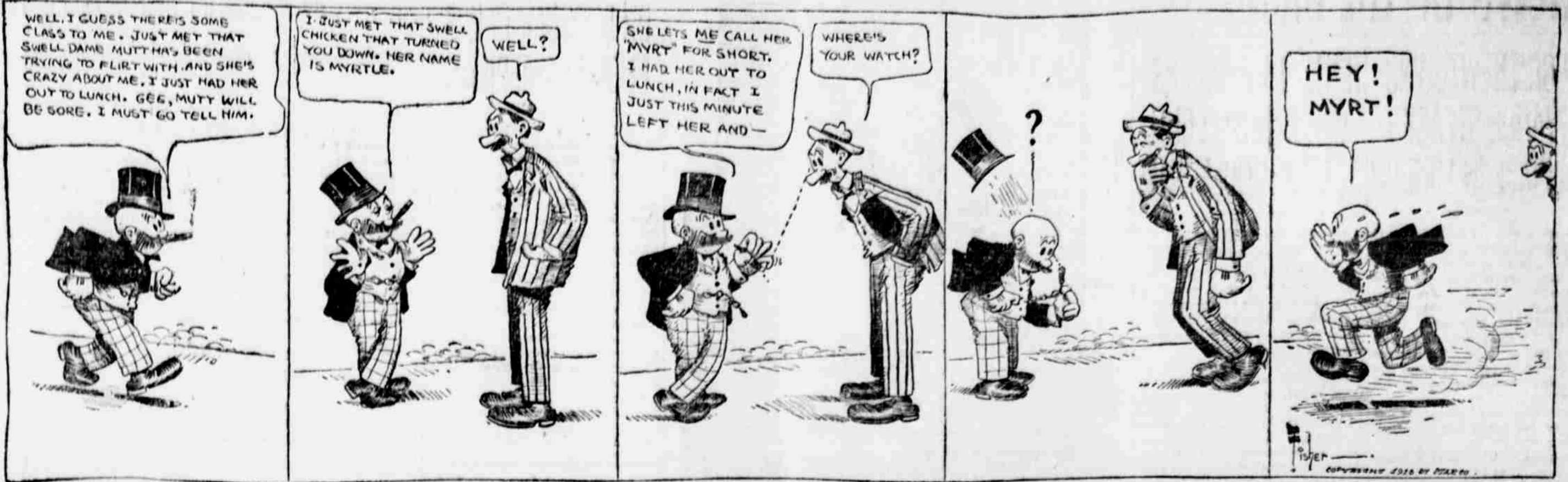


Yes, Indeed, Jeff Is Some Lady-killer. Oh, My, Yes!

MULHALL'S VICTIM BARRED AS TRAITOR BY FEDERATION

SEATTLE, Nov. 11.—Exposed before the recent lobby investigation committee of congress by Colonel Martin H. Mulhall as a traitor to organized labor, Jacob Tazelaar of Orange, N. J., was denied the right to sit as a delegate and driven from the floor of the convention of the American Federation of Labor today by President Samuel Gompers.

Tazelaar made a spectacular effort to secure recognition by the chair, and, failing, cried in a loud voice: "All right, I'll take my medicine."

The committee on credentials reported in favor of seating Max Hahn of Chicago, elected to take Tazelaar's place.

During the investigation Mulhall officials in New Jersey had been told that Tazelaar and other union leaders employ during the campaign to elect Congressman Hughes of New Jersey to the senate, in an effort to defeat Hughes. Mulhall said that he paid them \$1500 for their services. Hughes was a friend of organized labor and the unions were doing all they could to help his campaign, and Mulhall, as a representative of the National Employers' association, was to be used to help officials to work against Hughes secretly. Hughes was elected.

THIRTY-FOUR BLOODED GUERNSEYS IMPORTED

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 11.—Thirty-four head more of blue ribbon dairy stock were added to the bovine population of the Rogue valley Sunday when the car recently shipped to the Leonard Orchard company from Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin, arrived, and the cattle were unloaded after their long journey from almost across the continent. The shipment was composed of twenty grade Guernseys, two years old; ten registered Guernsey yearling heifers and four registered Holstein yearling heifers. The cattle all came through in excellent condition, and were taken out to the ranch, where they will soon have recovered entirely from the effects of the journey.

This shipment makes eighty-five head of grade and registered Guernsey and Holstein dairy cattle that the Leonard Orchard company has shipped in from the east during the past summer to stock the farm on the Rogue. The earlier shipments were of older cattle, the most of which are now giving milk.
