new supporters for President Huerta, Lind and I did not discuss the arms embargo during our talk at Vera Cruz. I am sorry now we did not, I would have advised against raising it.

"As a matter of fact, the embargo was raised secretly months ago, Huerta has gained vastly by Wilson's action."

"What I fear is that Americans will not be contented with raising the embargo merely," said Foreign Minister Mohena. "I am afraid they will begin helping the rebels actively."

Magon's assertion concerning the previous secret raising of the arms embargo was pretty generally accepted here as correct, the popular view being that the rebels had been getting all the arms and ammunition they paid for for a long time, and consequently that President Wilson's order will not help them much.

Moral Effect on People. Perhaps this opinion had something to do with the quietness with which the masses received the news of the Washington executive's action. At any rate, they showed fewer signs of excitement than had been expected.

The most intelligent public opinion, however, did not underestimate the moral of the order and the pro-Huerta press was violent in its denunciation of the American administration.

LID ON MEDFORD NAILED DOWN BY NEW COUNCIL

Action looking to the strict enforcement of the law against the sale of tobacco to minors in order to curb the cigarette evil among boys, was taken at the council meeting on Tuesday night, when the city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance in conformity with the state law, and Councilman Emerick was instructed to inform all cigar stores of the intention to strictly enforce the law. This was in accordance with the Greater Medford club demands.

Abolishment of card and dice games in hotels and the closing of all pool halls and bowling alleys at midnight was also ordered. The first is a reminder of an amendment to an ordinance passed by the old council granting this right. W. C. T. U. representatives requested that the pool halls be closed on Sunday, but members of the council held this would be a hardship on men who do not go to church on Sunday.

Officials at the last election presented bills for meals and had them disallowed on the ground that at \$3 per day they could afford to pay for their own meals. The bills for services were allowed.

The bond of Treasurer Lee Sampels for \$25,000 was approved and Bill Crawford appointed a regular policeman.

O'Gara from the California Home and Farm editors, asking for the right to use "Spray Calendar Bulletin 12" in their columns. The message continues, "we consider it the best calendar that has come to our attention."

The calendar was compiled and written by Prof. O'Gara. The California Home and Farm has 70,000 readers in California.

MEDFORD TO HAVE A MODERN CREAMERY

Earl C. Gaddis has sold his creamery business to W. L. Chappell, formerly of Laurel, Wash., an experienced creamery man who will establish a new and up-to-date plant in the Medford Creamery building next to the Nat.

New machinery valued at \$1000 is now on the road including a cream ripener, a modern churn with a capacity of 550 gallons and a butter-print cutter. The new plant will have a capacity of 2000 pounds of butter a day.

To give some idea of the amount of cream that is now being sent out of the valley to Portland and Independence concerns, between January 1 and 21, Talent shipped 838 gallons and nearly 500 gallons were shipped from Phoenix.

Mr. Chappell intends to keep this cream here and the first step toward doing so will be paying 30 cents per pound for butter fat and setting all accounts the 19th of each month.

Mr. Chappell has had extended experience in the creamery business in Minnesota and Washington and is confident there is a splendid opportunity in this valley.

YOUNG GIRLS MUST CUT OUT JOYRIDES

Girls under 18 years of age, out after curfew hours, and fair members of joyriding parties, must show the written consent of parents and a statement of their ages, by virtue of a police order promulgated by Chief of Police Hiltson this morning. This applies to attendance at picture shows, dances and other public places unless accompanied by parents or guardians. The patrolmen have been instructed to strictly enforce the order.

Cigar dealers were warned this afternoon against selling tobacco to minors, and the section of the state law against boys under 21 years smoking in public places or on the streets will be invoked. Many youths when halted after curfew hours maintain that they are 21. Hereafter they must show a written statement from their parents. The law does not protect the sons of fathers who allow them to smoke.

Instructions were also issued to arrest all participants in "crap games," including the proprietor of the place, without the formality of a warning.
