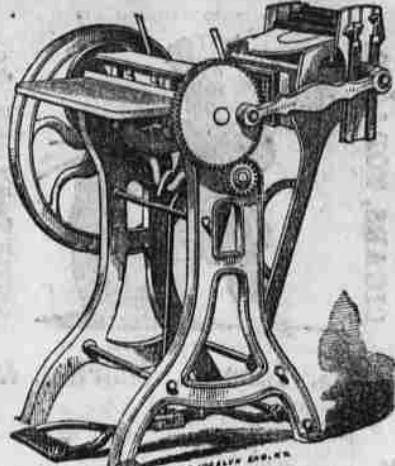

TO SERVE THREE YEARS, UNLESS SOONER DISCHARGED. Those serving two years, or to the close of the war, will be entitled to
\$100 BOUNTY.

The company will consist of one Captain, one First and one Second Lieutenant, one 1st Sergeant, one Quartermaster Sergeant, one Commissary Sergeant, five Sergeants, eight Corporals, two Teamsters, two Farriers or Blacksmiths, one Saddler, one Waggoner and seventy-eight Privates. The enlisted men will be sent to Fort Dalles, at Government expense, to be mustered into the service of the United States.

Rates of Pay.
First Sergeant, \$20 per month; all other Sergeants, \$17 Corporal, \$14; Farrier and Blacksmith, \$15; Private, \$13 Engler, \$13.

In addition the men will be furnished with clothing, arms, equipments, subsistence, quarters and medical attendance. The allowance for clothing is three dollars and fifty cents per month. When an enlisted man draws less than his yearly allowance of clothing he will be entitled to receive the difference in money. The men will be enlisted as Privates.
