

5,000,000 RUSSIANS GERMAN PRISONERS

GENEVA, via Paris, Sept. 16.—The number of Russians taken prisoners since May 1 by the Germans and Austrians is reckoned by La Saisiz at 2,571,750. It is stated that 6000 guns and 4000 machine guns have been captured. These figures have been compiled from official bulletins issued at Berlin and Vienna. It adds: "The official German-Austrian figures given out prior to May 1 showed a total of 1,395,000 Russian prisoners not including civilians or the dead and wounded. General Polivanoff, the Russian minister of war, in formed the Duma that the total of officers and men at the front since the beginning of the war was 5,000,000. Consequently the present total of Russian forces is 1,003,250."
