

HAMILTON WILL HEAD CHERRIANS FOR COMING YEAR

He will be installed at the annual banquet of the Cherrians to be held Monday evening, Jan. 2, at the Marion hotel. He succeeds Wm. McGilchrist, Jr.

Aggie Debaters Win.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Dec. 13.—The college added to its string of debate victories Monday night by defeating the University of Oregon at both Eugene and Corvallis by 2 to 1 decisions. This gives the college the state championship. The comparative record of the two institutions since 1915 now stands O. A. C. 23, University of Oregon 17.

WOOL CONTRACT IS HELD VALID

Of interest to wool growers as well as others who have contracted to deliver to cooperative associations, is the decision recently by Judge Percy R. Kelly in which the court holds that the contract with the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers is not in restraint of trade and that the contract is valid.

In the suit brought by the association against J. T. Wooddy, the defendant claimed that the association and contract were in restraint of trade and a monopoly. The decision of Judge Kelly, holding valid the contract, is the first time that the association contract has been passed upon by the courts. Recently in Salem, the contract of the Willamette Flax & Hemp Growers Cooperative association was also declared valid, by the Marion county circuit court.
