Big Cement Plant on the Snake.
 Advices are to the effect that within 30 days work will be commenced on the installation of a big cement plant at Lime Point, two miles above the mouth of the Grand Ronde on the Snake river. Negotiations for the machinery have been in progress for some days and it is reported that the deal was closed yesterday.

The initial plant will have a capacity of 500 barrels daily, which will ultimately be increased to 1000 barrels. The plant is to be installed by the West Coast Portland Cement company, composed of Seattle capitalists who have been investigating the project for several months. The decision to install the plant was reached after an opinion had been submitted by Chester S. Batchelder, a chemist and noted expert in the manufacture of Portland cement, the report being made on February 24.

Feeding Cattle for Exposition.
 The Washington State college will have an exhibit of fat cattle for the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle next year, says a Pullman item. W. D. Foster, the farm foreman, has five pure bred, Shorthorn steers which he is feeding for that purpose. Three of the steers were brought from W. H. Harvey. They will be past 2 years old when the exposition opens next summer. Mr. Foster has won an enviable reputation as a feeder of show cattle, his exhibits having won all prizes at the fat stock shows of the inland empire during the last three years.

New Church Dedicated.
 Rev. W. H. Bleakney, principal of the Pendleton academy, came up Saturday to assist in the dedication of the new church. Rev. Bleakney preached to a small congregation Saturday night as the weather was so bad that not many could get out. He also delivered the dedication sermon Sunday morning and a talk for the young folks in the evening. We are all justly proud of our church, as it is paid for and a balance in the treasury.—Mr. Hood Corner, Hood River News-Letter.

Few Engines in Round House.
 The round house is unusually barren of engines today, the temporary increase in freight business and heavy passenger traffic having taken the idle engines into use, says the La Grande Observer. Among the few

which are in the shop house are engines Nos. 380 and 385. The former has been repainted and overhauled, and is ready for use, being slated to go out tomorrow. No. 385 has been held here several weeks pending the arrival of the new axles to repair breaks which the locomotive sustained recently. The axles and wheels arrived yesterday and are being put in place today.

To Amend Union Charter.
 At the election June 1, a proposition to amend the charter of the city of Union will be submitted for ratification, says a Union item. The amendment is to allow the city to incur an indebtedness not to exceed \$55,000 for water, lights and sewage. Money for the purpose is to be secured by the sale of bonds.

It seems certain the amendment will carry, and that in that event work will begin at once on the installation of city lights and sewers. City scrip is selling at 65 cents on the dollar. A bond issue would brace up the credit of the place.

A Plan for Better Stock.
 Kill off or sell off those razor-backed hogs, little camel-humped, big-horned cows and woolly rabbit-breasted cayuses. The packing houses must have plump and fat animals. The horsemen will not use the cayuse if they can get a real horse. It costs but a trifle more to breed good stock and the market price looms up away and beyond the figure the runts are quoted for. It does not pay to raise runty, woolly, wire-nosed horses or cattle any more than to raise wormy apples.—Echo Register.

Successful Wheat Experiment.
 The Turkey wheat shipped in by F. F. Wamsley, from reports, is looking fine and if the present outlook continues it will make at least 25 bushels per acre. Mr. Wamsley has now a shipment of 60-days oats coming from the Washington Agricultural college, Pullman, Wash. The oats are grown by the college and are said to mature in 60 days. This will be something wonderful for the dry farms if successful.—Echo Register.

MURDERER CHEATS POSSE.

Bullet in Brain of Man Who Killed Sheriff Webb, Cheats Posse of Revenge.

A special to the Helena, Montana, Independent, from Billings tells of the suicide of Byckford, the murderer of Sheriff Webb, graphically as follows: Wounded by his attempts to evade the posse which surrounded him, and which sought to avenge the cold-blooded murder of Sheriff Webb, William C. Byckford this afternoon evaded capture by firing a bullet into his brain. At 2:30 o'clock this afternoon Jack Hereford, of Billings, and Deputy Sheriff Taylor of Mussel Shell approached the sheep wagon at Byckford had been lying since daylight and found him dead with a bullet in his temple, and a six-shooter in his hand. The rifle with which he had slain the sheriff lay at his side. But one shot had been fired from the revolver.

Prior to the time the body was found, many of the posse had arrived and the company wagon was surrounded by men. It was only after the long silence following the one shot fired that Hereford ventured to approach the wagon. No further shots greeted him, and peering into the vehicle he saw Byckford lying dead on his back, his head in a pool of blood and his gun in his hand. Andrew Comstock, the alleged partner of Byckford, was arrested this afternoon at the Hereford farm, charged with complicity in former cattle raids with Byckford. Comstock said Byckford had told him that he (Byckford) had killed a sheriff in some other state, but it is impossible to ascertain where.

The body of Byckford will reach Billings over the Northern Pacific tomorrow. The funeral of Sheriff Webb will be held Friday. Business will be suspended, and six sheriffs from adjoining counties will act as pallbearers. At the inquest over Sheriff Webb's body this afternoon it was determined that death had been instantaneous as the result of a bullet fired by Byckford.

READS LIKE A NOVEL.
 True Story of a Danish Farmer and How He Found His Fortune.

To have saved the life of a fellow emigrant in a wreck off the coast of Newfoundland in 1873, to have wandered into the vastness of the arid American desert and 35 years later to have read in a newspaper plastered upon the walls of a homesteader's shack an advertisement which led to his becoming the recipient of a fortune of \$375,000, is the strange fortune of Peter Anderson, a Danish farm hand, who lives near here, says a White Bluffs item. The circumstances were made public this morn-

ing when Anderson received a check for \$5000 in order to enable him to proceed to New York to carry out the legal formalities necessary in the transference of the big sum. Anderson left his Danish home in the fall of 1873 for the United States on the ship W. J. Gottry. Off the coast of Newfoundland the vessel was wrecked, and the passengers had to swim for their lives.

Three Candidates for the Gallows in Missouri on April 3.
 Jefferson City, Mo., Mar. 27.—Next Friday, April 3, will be hangman's day in Missouri, the supreme court having fixed that date for the execution of three men.

The convicted men are: William Jeffrey, St. Charles county, for killing a person in attempting to commit robbery; Frank Daly, alias A. C. Biles, of Kansas City, for the murder of Robert Harvey by giving him poisoned whiskey in St. Louis; John Baker, a negro, Boone county, for killing a negro and wounding two others while shooting at a fourth.
