MATAWAN, N. J., June 3.—Great excitement exists over the daring attempt to burglarize the residence of Cashier William H. Tutthill of the People's National Bank.  
At an early hour the burglar awoke Miss Maggie Tutthill, sister of the bank cashier, who, after listening called her brother. Not realizing any danger, she made her way to his room, but was prevented from entering by the intruder, who suddenly struck her over the head with a sandbag, which fell her to the floor. The villain struck her again and again with the sandbag until each blow left its mark. Her screams were heard by Cashier Tutthill, who quickly got his gun and attempted to shoot the robber, but the gun would not go off.  
The villain jumped out of a second story window. The occupants of the house began screaming, which aroused the neighbors, who chased the robber with pistols and shotguns.  
When Miss Tutthill was carried to her room she could not speak. Later she said that the man was rather tall and that she was struck several times across the head with an instrument called a sandbag.  
Miss Tutthill is somewhat marked about the face, and it is thought that some scars will remain to disfigure her. Tutthill was somewhat frightened. It is thought that Mr. Tutthill had some \$50,000 or \$40,000 for deposit in his Keyport bank.

**P. O. S. OF A. ITEMS.**  
**News From all Parts Concerning the Order.**  
Garfield Commandery, No. 21, of Mahanoy City, will parade at Hazleton on July 4th, with Hazle Commandery, No. 17, in the immense joint demonstration of the P. O. S. of A. and Jr. O. U. A. M.  
Shenandoah Commandery, No. 21, will probably participate in the parade at Frackville on the morning of July 4th, in the demonstration under the auspices of Camp 63. In the evening the commandery will participate in the tabeau parade to be arranged by Camp 125, of Girardville.  
Commanderies No. 43, Chester, 22, Tower City, and 52, Hanover, of the Patriotic Guard, P. O. S. of A., have withdrawn from body and have entered the S. of A.  
Commander General John R. Mast, of Reading, is the right man at the head of the S. of A. He is an indefatigable worker and will make a grand showing for the order by the time the state convention is held next February.  
The special returns from commanderies which have entered the S. of A. show a membership of 1,700 and it is expected the membership in the state will reach 2,500 by next August. This will enable the organization to open the Mortuary Payment Fund with the required membership to pay \$250 benefit on the death of a member, or his wife.  
Lincoln Commandery, of Philadelphia, received 26 applications for membership at its last meeting.  
The new rituals are in the hands of thirty-two commanderies, and they have elicited flattering comments.  
Only two commanderies of the old organization in this state remain out of the new order, but from indications it will not be long before they will wheel into line.  
Commandery No. 14 turned out 21 men on Decoration Day. Their soldierly appearance and marching, as they marched up Main street in company front, elicited applause. There is no reason why this commandery should not turn out from 40 to 60 men at a time. This would add considerably to the appearance of the organization.
