**THE LOST GREEK EXPLOSION.**

**Mine Inspector Stein Investigates the Case of Miskell and Piper Who Were Burned to Death. The Testimony.**

Mine Inspector William Stein has made an investigation of the circumstances surrounding the recent explosion of gas in a breast of Packard colliery No. 4, whereby Anthony Miskell and Joseph Piper, two Polish miners of town, met their deaths, and has taken evidence of the colliery employees.

A HERALD reporter had a conversation with the Mine Inspector this morning just before he took a Lehigh Valley train for Park Place. The Inspector said: "I have fully investigated the unfortunate affair and I am satisfied in my own mind that there is no foundation for the charges made against the fire boss of the colliery by friends of the two dead men. They say that the deceased told the fire boss and he told them they could go into the breast, although he had not examined it. My investigation credits this story entirely.

"The fire boss is William Bainbridge. Yesterday I examined Hops, Noon and Fritz, the three bottom men, and they swear positively that they heard Bainbridge warn Miskell and Piper not to go into their breast until he would return, as there was gas in their place. The witnesses also say that two Poles were present when this warning was given. They could not be found yesterday, but will be present at the coroner's inquest. In addition to this Bainbridge, the fire boss, swears he examined the place at 6:20 in the morning, found gas there and warned the unfortunate men."
