Frankie Mack, of Providence, and Ted Lewis, Englishman, will meet in a 20-round bout next Saturday at Havana.

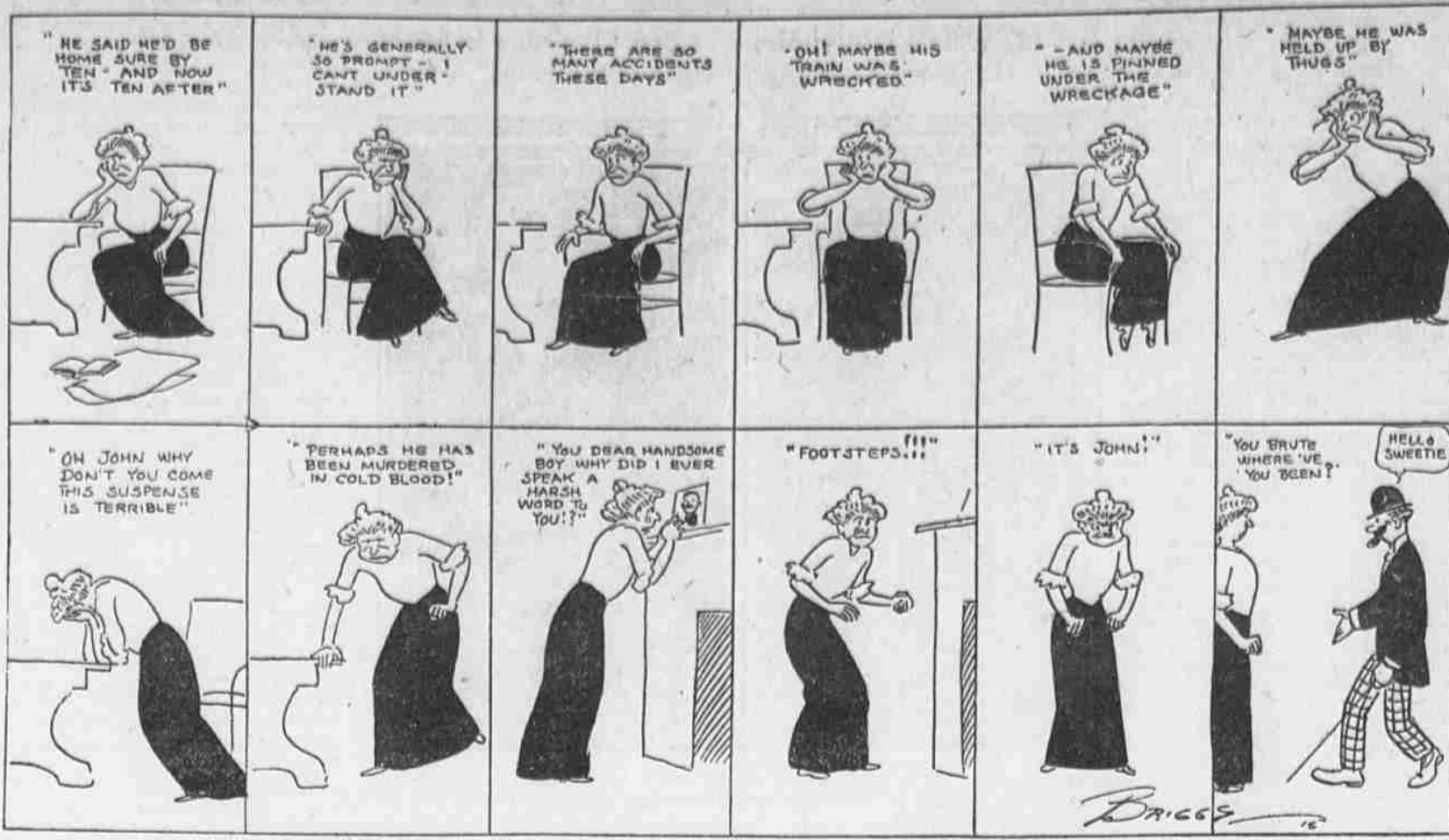
FARRELL AND LUCAS AT FAIRMOUNT TONIGHT

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BOUNDED UP TO WILLIAMS AS KILBANE ACCEPTS

Featherweight Champ Yields All Terms to Bantam Titleholder to Force Long-Discussed Fight.

The proposed Johnny Kilbane-Ed Williams fight, which has been hanging in the air for more than a month, will be settled at the Olympia A. A. this city, if promoter Harry D. Edwards succeeds in getting Sammy Harris, manager of bantam champion, to consent to match.

This fact developed this afternoon in receipt of a telegram from Jimmy Dunn, Kilbane's advisor, to the Sports Editor of the Evening Ledger.

Dunn's message was: "Sports Editor THE EVENING LEDGER: I don't want to give Williams any excuse to get out of the match with Kilbane. I accepted terms from Harris yesterday. I have given in to everything that was asked. Now it is up to Williams."

Jack Hanlon, Edwards' assistant, yesterday afternoon that if the Olympia Club got the much-talked-of battle, it would be staged Wednesday evening, March 17.

According to word from Dunn in Cleveland, it is agreed to the weight of 135 pounds ring-side, and to the purse, with a privilege of 35 per cent of the receipts. However, he was holding out on the Billy Rocaop, referee intended for the match.

However, now that Kilbane's manager has consented to everything, the matter of getting Harris to sign up for Williams is a problem that has a strong backing in Hanlon left for New York this afternoon. The purpose of his trip there, it is supposed, is to get Harris' signature.

BOUTS FOR WILMINGTON NOW SEEM ASSURED
