

VARE WARDS 'KNIFE' PENROSE, BUT RUM IS 'REGULAR' TODAY

Senator's Vote Is Expected to Run About 10,000 Behind That of Doctor Brumbaugh in South Philadelphia.

South Philadelphia is "knifing" Penrose today, but the Vare stronghold is not united in making a slaughter of it.

In the 29th Ward, the Vares' home ward, and in the 1st and 29th Wards Penrose was cut heavily, and the knife also occurred in the 26th and 4th Wards.

The Vares have virtually "laid down" in the fight and the rum interests are bolstering up Penrose's candidacy in that section.

The reason given for this is that the Vares are "regulars." After Representative Penrose's speech in Congress, and permitted Penrose buttons to be thrown away, and the anti-Penrose spirit of revenge, which had been smoldering since Penrose threw Vare down in 1911, to flame up.

At the last minute, however, the word was passed that the Vares could not knife Penrose because they were "regulars."

So today, in nearly every division in the Vare half-city, voters are disregarding tips from their leaders and are knifing Penrose.

The saloon vote in South Philadelphia, a "most to a man, is behind Penrose today. Those opposed to local option, for the sake of their pocketbooks, are deaf to the anti-Penrose whispers.

No orders have been issued, they explained, and they can vote as they please with a clear conscience. They received the intimations from the Vare ward leaders with jubilation, and are trying hard to rally the South Philadelphia vote to Penrose.

"PENROSE WILL BE CUT." One Vare worker, in the 29th Ward, the Vares' own ward, said this morning:

"Yes, Penrose will be cut all right." The Vare personal following, he said, will not let this opportunity to revenge itself on Penrose pass.

The vote is heavy in all of the South Philadelphia wards. In the 29th ward and in the 1st ward, Vare machines workers who are on the election boards, entered the booths with voters and helped them mark their ballots.

Harry C. Hanley, president of Select Council and Vare leader in the 2d Ward, said today that Senator Vare had ordered his followers to vote a straight ticket.

"The Vare orders are not to cut Penrose," he said. "Congressman Vare's statement in Washington was made for effect. The Republicans in South Philadelphia would vote a straight ticket whether ordered to do so or not. It would be suicide for them to cut Penrose, as they are looking forward to the Mayoralty election next year, and must keep the Republican vote solid for that."

"There is a deadlock in this ward," said one of the Vare leaders in the 26th Ward today. "The Penrose vote could not be rallied. Vare was born and raised down here, and when Penrose was credited with making charges against Vare this section turned against Penrose and could not be forced to vote for him."

SENATOR VARE VOTES.

State Senator Edwin H. Vare appeared on the streets late this morning. He has been suffering from poisoning in his eyes and forehead. He visited his doctor and then went straight to the polling place at Moyamensing and Snyder avenues, where he voted shortly before noon.

USES KNIFE ON BOARDER

Husband Declares He Caught Man Trying to Kiss Wife.

Francis Penrose, 21 years old, 218 East Thompson street, snatched a kitchen knife from the hands of his wife, who was peeling potatoes, and used it on a boarder who, he said, was caught trying to kiss the woman. He was arrested and held in 100 bail today by Magistrate Campbell, of the Belgrade and Clearfield streets station, for further hearing November 10.

The boarder, Dominick Diaversi, 25 years old, declared he loaned Mrs. Penrose \$10 and that the couple was trying to get the \$10. Four slight stab wounds he received were dressed at the Episcopal Hospital.

CHIROPODISTS WAR ON ILLEGAL PRACTITIONERS

State Society Insists Law Requiring Licenses Be Complied With.

Licensed chiropodists, through the Chiropody Society of Pennsylvania, are waging a campaign to rid the State of practitioners who have not passed a required examination. The penalty for illegal practicing of chiropody is a \$500 fine or six months' imprisonment.

OBJECT TO SPEED MEASURE

Auto Club Opposes Proposed Eight-Mile Limit Ordinance.

An emphatic protest against the proposed ordinance now before City Council to limit the speed of automobiles on city streets to eight miles per hour was made in a letter sent by the Automobile Club of Philadelphia to its members. They are urged to write their Councilmen and request the defeat of the measure.

ALTERCATION AT POLLS

Independent's Nose Broken, Republican Insulted. Argument concerning the legality of a Republican inspector's credentials at the polling place of the 14th Division of the 2d Ward, 619 Wharton street, today precipitated an argument which resulted in an injured nose for Nathan Nachemowitz, a Washington party watcher, and the arrest of his alleged assailant, Bobbie Gibbons, who fills a similar office for the Republican organization.

At the primaries Nathan Shoemaker was made an inspector following a "curbstone election," at which several party workers talked the thing over and decided Nathan was competent to hold the position.

Shoemaker appeared at the polling place today and insisted on the right to the office. Nachemowitz objected, declaring Shoemaker's appointment invalid. Gibbons attempted to settle the question with an attack on the Washington party man, according to the police.

3 ARRESTS FOR ILLEGAL VOTING; 50 WARRANTS OUT

First Attempt to Evade Election Laws in West Philadelphia. Illegal voting in West Philadelphia today resulted in the arrest of three men and a Negro, and the police say warrants are out for more than 50 other persons, who will be taken into custody when they attempt to vote in various sections.

SENATOR PENROSE, IN JOVIAL MOOD, CASTS VOTE AT NOON

SLOT-METER THIEVES CAUGHT

Arrested While Emerging From House on Ellsworth Street. The lives of residents of seven houses in the 15th ward were endangered at an early hour this morning, when two men entered the buildings through cellar windows and attempted to break open slot meters. The houses entered were 208-18-21-23-25 and 202 Ellsworth street, but the only meter they succeeded in breaking open was in the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Ellison, where the men obtained 18 cents.

\$37,169,694 ASKED TO PAY MUNICIPAL EXPENSES IN 1916

Department's Estimate \$3,518,420 More Than Amount Appropriated This Year—Loan Money Idle.

The estimated cost of operating all city departments and county offices of Philadelphia during 1915 is \$37,169,694, or \$3,518,420 more than the sum appropriated by Councils for the city and county during the current year.

City Controller Walton will submit to Councils, at the session on Thursday, his report on the financial condition of the city, with the estimated income and expenditures during 1915. Included in this report will be the detailed estimate of each branch of municipal and county government for operation during the coming year.

ESTIMATES FOR NEXT YEAR

Following is the estimated cost for maintaining each branch of government in 1916, as will be submitted by the Controller. A comparison of the appropriations made to the units of city and county government during the present year:

APPROXIMATE REVENUE

It has been estimated by the Board of Revision of Taxes that the income from taxable realty in 1915 will be approximately \$18,000,000 for city and county expenses based on the 11 tax rate. The 10-cent tax rate of the Board of Education will produce half the above amount for the city school system.

From water rents, returns from gas sales under the terms of the lease, and other sources, the city will receive in 1915 the sum of \$15,000,000 in sinking fund charges. The revenue on the loan from the banks at 2 per cent. has amounted to \$80,000.

Verdict in Case of Robert Monogue
