

1914 BANNER YEAR FOR UNION LABOR, LEADERS DECLARE

70,000 Members Have Been Added to Ranks and Movement Has Won Several Notable Victories.

The year 1914, labor leaders say, will go down as one of the most fruitful in the history of the American labor movement.

The year has not been without many bitter struggles and much suffering, as shown in the strikes in West Virginia, Michigan and Colorado.

Perhaps the most significant victory for organized labor was the adoption of the labor clause in the Clayton anti-trust law, declaring that labor hereafter would be immune from prosecution under the law.

Many adherents of the I. W. W. are said to have returned to the fold of the American Federation of Labor.

A significant phenomenon of the labor movement during the year has been the growth of political action and political activity among the rank and file.

In the words of Samuel Gompers: "The year 1914 will go down as a banner year in the history of the labor movement in America. Despite the many struggles, despite the tremendous amount of work that is still to be done, we are moving forward and will continue to do so until our goal is reached, when there shall be no more strikes and no more strife and when economic justice and industrial democracy shall complete the purpose for which the American Republic has been formed—liberty."

Chief of Compulsory Education Bureau Asks Donations From Charitable.

An effort to provide Christmas cheer for the 900 children of this city who are unable to attend school because they lack adequate clothing is being made by Henry J. Gideon, chief of the Bureau of Compulsory Education, who has appointed the Union Benevolent Association, 715 Spruce street, distributing agent for contributions to be devoted to these cases.

Mr. Gideon points out that no time could be more opportune for such donations. Reports from the attendance officers show that children hitherto regular in attendance are forced to remain huddled in cold rooms, having neither shoes, coats nor hats to enable them to face the winter weather. In many cases all furniture and bedding has been disposed of in order that food might be purchased.

Mr. Gideon emphasizes the fact that the clothing donated need not be new to the needy; the essential point being warmth, which will not only relieve the actual physical suffering, but do much to check the rapid inroads being made by disease among these families.
