THE PHILADELPHIA ORCHESTRA

Reallotment of Seats to Former Subscribers is Completed.

The reallotment of seats to former subscribers of the Philadelphia Orchestra has been effected and the resubscription is the largest ever known in the history of the orchestra. The general sale for the season will open on Friday morning, October 2, and continue until Thursday evening, October 8.

Among the musicians who returned this week was Attilio Marchetti, the first oboist, and Robert Lindeman, the first clarinetist, and Paul Almerston, the second clarinetist. Mr. Marchetti was in Trieste when hostilities began and on his return to his native country, Italy, he had the unpleasant experience of being under arrest for two days on suspicion of being an Austrian spy.

As the violinists engaged include Fritz Kreisler and Jacques Thibaud, some doubt has been expressed as to the possibility of their being able to keep their engagements with the orchestra during the coming season. The rumors of the death of Mr. Kreisler, who is scheduled to appear here with the Philadelphia Orchestra on January 29 and 30, have been denied on no

Eleanor Duse is to retire permanently from the stage. She gives up, so report has it, because she cannot find suitable plays, though her age has also been a factor in hurrying her retirement. Miss Bates has not appeared here since the commencement of her Western tour in the A. E. W. Mason play, "The Witness for the Defense." Miss Doro returns to this country after a year's absence in London, where she acted Dora in the London production of "Diplomacy." The English members of the "Diplomacy" cast arrived on the Lusitania Friday.
