or over, \$2,167,328 were reported engaged in gainful occupations. In other words, about 25,000,000 worked for money...

LEGAL REGULATION NEEDED. "And some of this gainful employment rather needs legal regulating. For instance, the report shows that 1994 women were engaged in the extraction of minerals...

"The water transportation industries are represented by 15 women boatmen, cabinmen and lockkeepers, by 12 longshoremen and stevedores and by 12 sailors and deckhands. Road and street transportation shows 37 women back drivers, 33 women chauffeurs, 13 draymen and 6 women hostesses and stable hands."

"The way that the male makers of laws and rulers of industry have forced little boys and girls of from 10 to 13 to labor in industry is also shown. There are, for instance, 1508 boys and five girls between 10 and 13 working in coal mines. One of these little girls is a breaker hand. There are 19 boys under 12 years of age in copper mines, 28 in iron mines, 51 boys and 12 girls in lead and zinc mines. There are 352 boys and 21 girls under 13 in clothing factories, corset factories, glove factories, hat factories...

WHAT CENSUS SHOWS. In the fourth volume of the Report of the 13th Census, just published, there are some interesting figures on the part of women in the industrial life of our country. Mr. Gilson Gardner reviews the report as follows:

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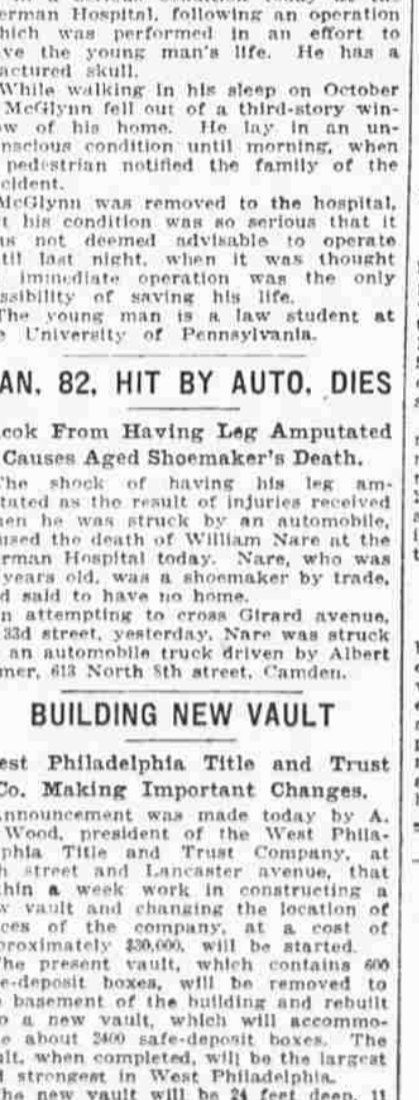
