NEGRO HELD AS HIGHWAYMAN

William Richardson, a Negro, of 514 South 12th street, charged with highway robbery, was held today without bail for court in the 12th and Pine streets police station by Magistrate Haggerty. Richardson was an accomplice in the police box case, assaulted and robbed Joseph Falkenberg, 65 years old, of Bacon Hill, Md., in an alley near 10th and Naudain streets, yesterday, when the old man was taken sick and lost his way.

VISITING DENTIST SHOT BY DR. HERTZ DURING ARGUMENT

Aged Man, Also a Dental Practitioner, and Friend Disagreed Over Merits of Respective Schools.

One man is in the Jefferson Hospital today in a serious condition with a cartridge wedged in his cheek and two aged dentists, one charged with the shooting, are held under bail as the result of an argument over the relative merits of the old and new schools of dentistry.

The injured man is Dr. Calvin McBride, of Harrisburg, also a dentist. The man charged with the shooting is Dr. Silas G. Hertz, 72 years old, of 1113 Chestnut street. His brother, Dr. Elam M. Hertz, 70 years old, is held as a material witness. Doctor McBride was a friend of the Hertz's.

Two men who are said to have been in the dentist's office when the shooting occurred are being sought by the police as witnesses. According to the information given by the aged brother, McBride attempted to strike Dr. Silas Hertz in the course of an argument and "the gun went off."

McBride has been employed at various times in dental offices in Market street. He is said by the police to have been intoxicated shortly after 7 o'clock last night when he entered the office of the Hertz brothers. According to statements obtained by Detective Emanuel and Special Policeman Lazzelle, McBride told Doctor Hertz he was an "old fogey."

A debate as to the relative merits of the old and modern schools of dentistry followed. Soon it grew warm, and Doctor Hertz ordered McBride from his office. The Harrisburg man refused to go, and a moment later the shooting took place.

The weapon used by Doctor Hertz was a Cooper six-shooter. It was made in Frankford in 1851 and was loaded with hand-made paper cartridges of powder and ball. All but one of the chambers were loaded when the revolver was found by the police beneath a pile of papers in the dental office.

"TRUST" NOT GUILTY OF COERCION, STEEL LAWYER CONTENDS

Severance Quotes Taft and Gary, and Asks Court to Ignore "New Government Economic Theories."

Urging Judges Bullington, Hunt, McPherson and Woolley to eliminate any New Government theory of economics from their decision in regard to the charges against the "Steel Trust," C. A. Severance, of St. Paul, Minn., arguing for the United States Steel Corporation today, in a forceful way touched upon various phases of the operation of the defendant company.

"We are not here to consider new theories of economics," said Mr. Severance, "we have been criticized unjustly by the Government."

Every seat in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, in the Federal Building, was occupied when the hearing was resumed this morning.

The St. Paul attorney cited various United States Court decisions in different trust cases. He denied that the "Steel Trust" or any of the 150 subsidiary companies were guilty of coercion.

Referring to pools, the attorney said that there were pools in this country long before the Government began its crusade against alleged violations of the Sherman anti-trust laws. He named the price pool, the tube pool, wire pool, which existed in the early eighties. Prices of all steel products were quoted in court, each price was accompanied with official records.
