GENERAL DAVIDSON AT PASCOGUILA. NEW ORLEANS, December 14.—Despatches were received yesterday announcing the arrival of a detachment of General Davidson's expedition at Pascoaguila, on the Texas coast, with his division of cavalry, from Baton Rouge.

THE EXPEDITION HAS BEEN SUCCESSFUL. The expedition has been eminently successful and its march through the enemy's country has been marked by a series of important operations. On the march large quantities of supplies of various kinds, which would have been of great value to the enemy, were destroyed.
