

# U. S. 7-30 LOAN.

The Secretary of the Treasury gives notice that subscriptions will be received for Coupon Treasury Notes, payable three years from Aug. 10th, 1864, with semi-annual interest at the rate of seven and three-tenths per cent. per annum.—principal and interest both to be paid in lawful money.

These notes will be convertible at the option of the holder at maturity, into six per cent. gold bearing bonds, payable not less than five nor more than twenty years from their date, as the Government may elect. They will be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$5,000, and all subscriptions must be for fifty dollars or some multiple of fifty dollars.

The notes will be transmitted to the owners free of transportation charges as soon after the receipt of the original Certificates of Deposit as they can be prepared.

As the notes draw interest from August 15, persons making deposits subsequent to that date must pay the interest accrued from date of note to date of deposit.

Parties depositing twenty-five thousand dollars and upwards for these notes at any one time will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per cent., which will be paid by the Treasury department upon the receipt of a bill for the amount, certified to by the officer with whom the deposit was made. No deductions for commissions must be made from the deposits.

## PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, in and by the act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to direct the manner, time and place of holding Elections for President and Vice Presidents of the United States," enacted the 23d day of February, 1820, it is required of the Sheriff to give due notice of such Elections: therefore

I, JAMES W. HAMILTON, High Sheriff of the county of Juniata, do hereby make known and give this public notice to the citizens of said county, who are qualified to vote for members of general assembly, that on the SECOND TUESDAY OF NOVEMBER next, being the 8th day of said month, an election will be held at the same place at which the said member shall have voted for a he is now residing.

I ALSO MAKE KNOWN and give notice in and by the 19th section of the aforesaid Act I am directed, that every person, except Justice of the Peace, who shall hold an office of appointment, of profit or trust, under the Government of the United States, or of this State, or of any City or incorporated District, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise,

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the 7th section of the Act, first aforesaid, the Judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate of return of the election of their respective districts and produce them at a meeting of the Judges from each district, at the Court House in the Borough of Millfstown on the third Friday after the day of election, being for the present year on Friday, the 11th day of November, A. D. 1864, then and there to do and perform the duties required by law of said Judges.

Also, by the 19th section of an Act to regulate elections by soldiers in actual military service, approved the 23rd of August, A. D. 1864, "the return Judges of the several counties, shall enjoin to meet at the place, now directed by law, on the third Friday after general or Presidential election, for the purpose of counting the soldiers' votes."

Also that where a Judge by sickness or unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges, then the certificate of return aforesaid, shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or Clerks of a district of said district, who shall do and perform the duties required of said Judge unable to attend.

Agreeably to the provisions of the 61st section of said act, every General and Special election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening when the polls shall be closed.
