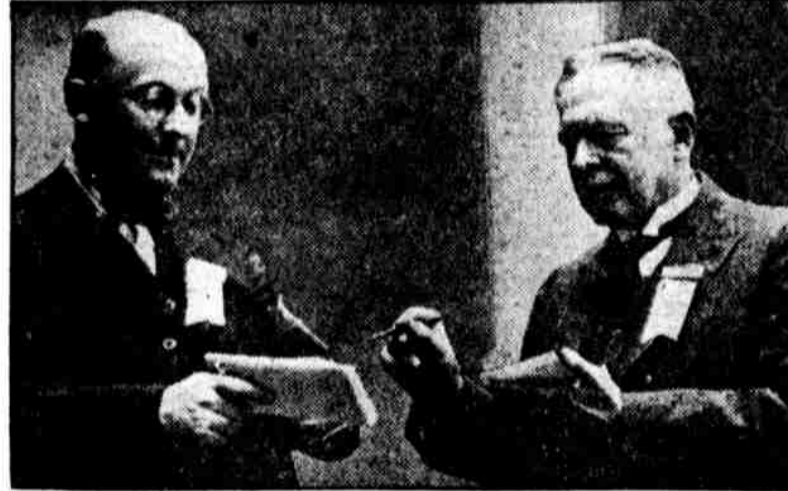

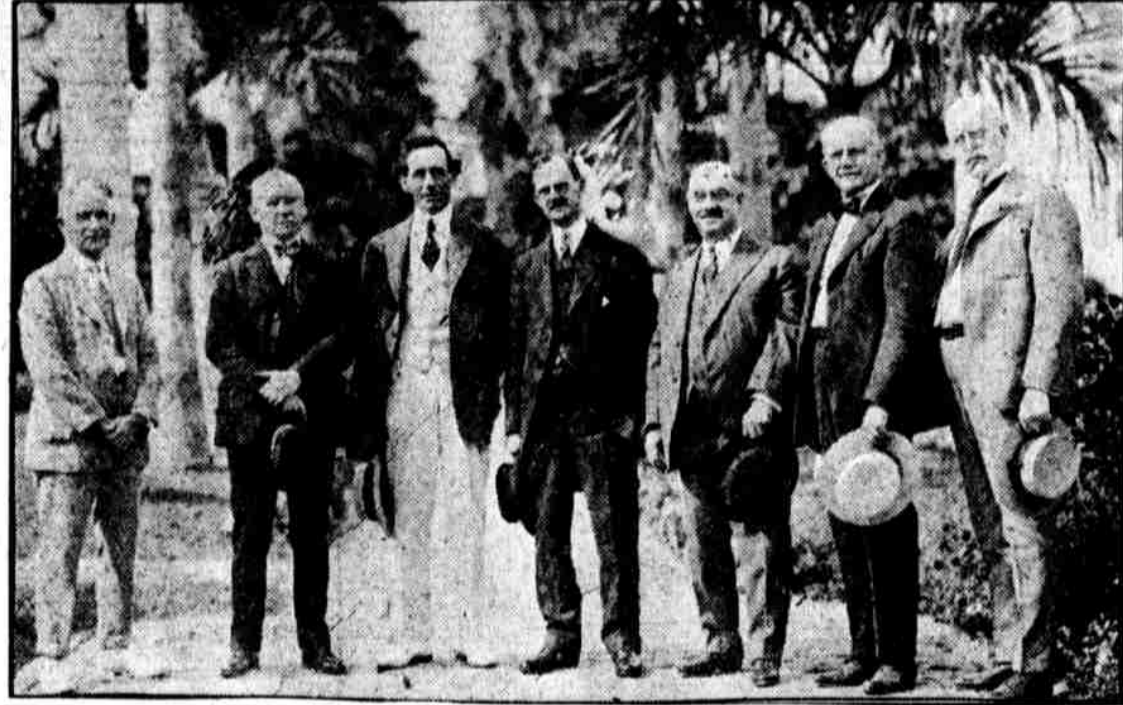

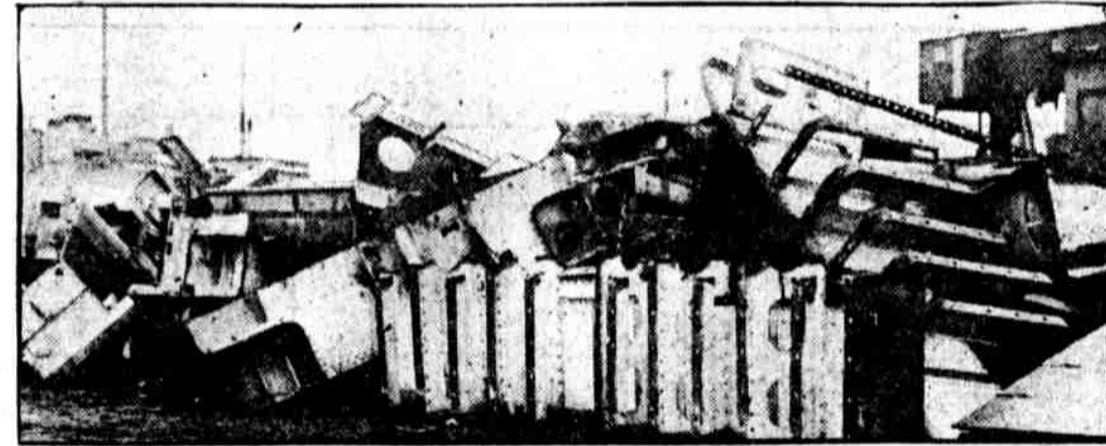

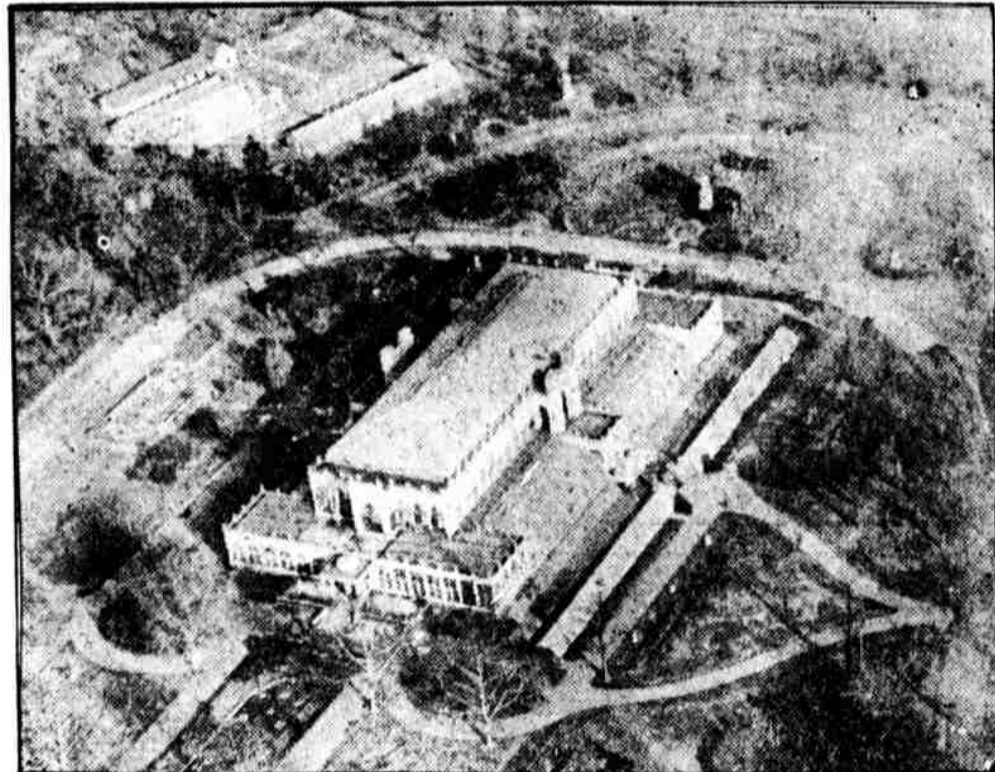
SHE NEVER LOST HOPE. Mrs. Anna L. Farrell, wife of Lieut. Farrell, of the ill-fated balloon crew.

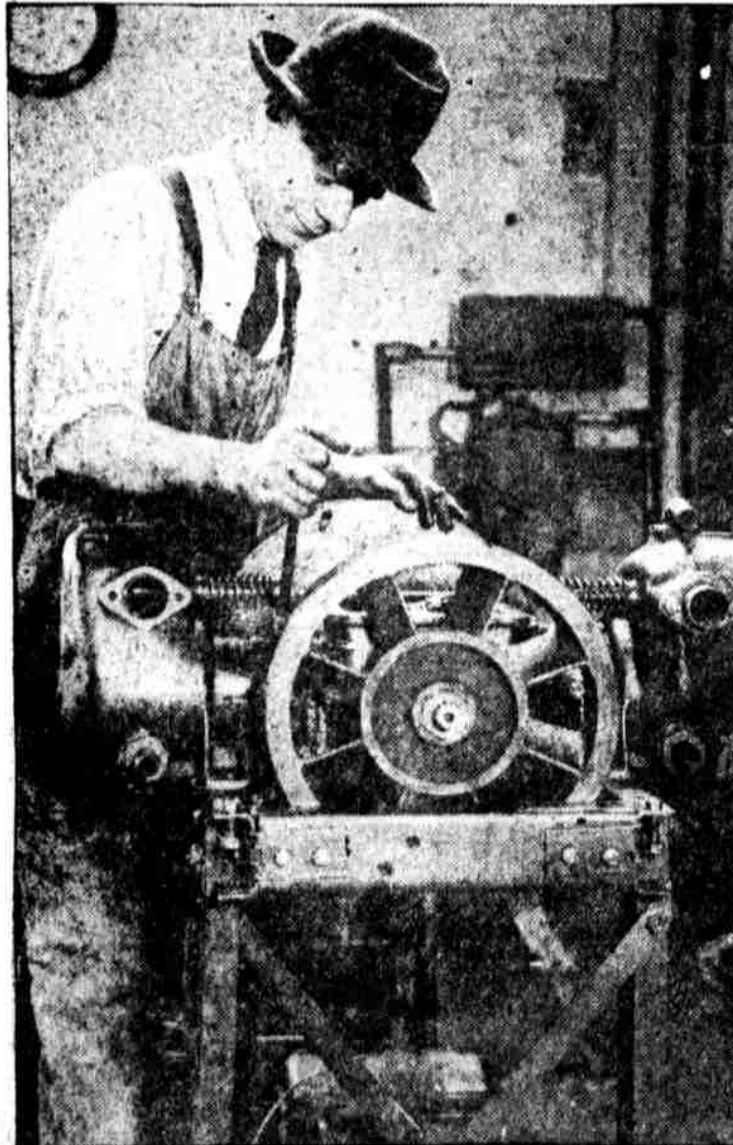


HORTICULTURAL HALL. The large building in West Fairmount Park and the hot-houses in the background were snapped from the Ledger's newsplane.
