

FRIENDS OF ERIN TO ANSWER SIMS

List of 5000 Irish-Americans Who Died in War to Be Published

NAVY PAPER LAUDS ADMIRAL

Washington, June 14.—The National Association for the Recognition of the Irish Republic has announced that, as an answer to the speech made in London by Admiral Sims, it will make public a list of 5000 names of Irish-Americans who died on the battle fields of France. The list will be published on the day Admiral Sims lands in the United States on his return from England, the announcement said, and the names will be authenticated at the War Department.

The Army and Navy Register warmly espouses Admiral Sims' cause. In an editorial entitled "The Recognition of Admiral Sims," the paper pillories the attack on Admiral Sims as a "voter-trucking affair," assails Sinn Fein as "miserable traitors," and declares Admiral Sims more entitled to "honorary citizenship" than a republican. The article says:

"The periodic reprimand of Rear Admiral Sims has achieved the virtues of mathematical precision. About every so often that officer says something with a vigor and frankness that surprises the Navy Department, when it does not openly shock it or, as now, when it reduces the Secretary of the Navy to a state of confessed amazement.

"No language can be strong enough in the condemnation of those who, during the war, sympathized with Germany and did what they could to materially aid the enemy. If Mr. Denby was looking for an opportunity to be amazed he might very well have transferred his emotions to the ignoble incident of the 'fruit' washed in from British subjects in secret alliance with the Germans. The comment of Rear Admiral Sims upon these miserable traitors deserves applause."

Up to this morning no reply has come from Admiral Sims to Secretary Denby's order of recall on June 11. No significance is attached to every circumstance at the Navy Department, because, at the moment, there is delay in Trans-Atlantic communication.

London, June 14.—(By A. P.)—Commenting on the Sims case, the Morning Post says: "Everybody in the United States and everybody in this country knows that Admiral Sims spoke the exact truth."

Expressing thorough agreement with Admiral Sims' assertion that it was necessary to counteract Sinn Fein influence for harm during the war, the paper declares it is still necessary, and adds: "And how this can be done if men like Admiral Sims do not speak their minds, we are unable to conceive. We believe that the great mass of Americans, equally with the people of Great Britain, are heartily resolved upon the maintenance of friendship between the two nations. We therefore appeal to all good Americans to see that the Irish, who are a curse to every strand in which they set foot, are not permitted to work their wicked will."

SIX DIE IN OKLAHOMA FLOOD

Cloudburst Swells Two Creeks Above Sayre

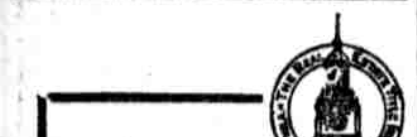

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TO ARREST ZION'S VAMPS

Threaten to Make "Half-Naked" Women Join Road Repair Force

Zion, Ill., June 14.—(By A. P.)—Zion's road repair force soon may be augmented by women, if Overseer Will Pur Glenn Voliva keeps his latest promise against women who wear dresses which expose more than their necks to the "junction with the collar bone."

Three women already have been warned by notices and presented with printed notices giving them a "reasonable time to retire from public view."

Last night at the Tabernacle Voliva issued his final warning: "The police," he said, "will arrest any woman in this town that goes around the streets half-naked. I will not ball you out, either, and neither will your husband. You will have to pay your fine or work it out on the streets."

MAN IDENTIFIED AS BANDIT

\$3000 Recovered at Suspect's Home, Say Pittsburgh Police

Pittsburgh, June 14.—(By A. P.)—The alleged identity of one of the bandits who Friday last held up and fatally wounded James Neal, bank messenger of the Bogen & Buhl department store, is revealed by the police as Gilbert Kelly, twenty-two years old, of Switzville, a suburb.

More than \$3000 of the \$50,000 obtained by the robbers was recovered last Saturday at the Kelly home, according to the police.

Superintendent of Police Carroll today ordered a clean-up of all undesirable, special squads of patrolmen have been detailed to this duty.

ONION BATH WAS FREE

Atlantic City Bathers Bombarded With 'Fruit' Brought in by Combers

Atlantic City, June 14.—The big combers rolling up on the resort's beach yesterday had unusual strength. A breath of sea air brought tears to the eyes of visitors who inhaled the ozone along some sections of the strand.

All because of a tidal wave of Bermuda onions buried ashore. Bathers at some of the central bathing beaches engaged in a veritable battle with the bombardment of "fruit" washed in from the sea and the pungent odor of the onions ground to pieces by the action of the breakers almost took the breath away.

Beach rakers "mined" several tons of the onions, which had apparently been cast or washed off in crates from some freighter.

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UNION CHIEFS SPLIT ON IRISH QUESTION

Federation Asked to Indorse British Boycott in Official Resolution

FACTIONAL FIGHT FORECAST

Denver, June 14.—Efforts to prevent a widening of the breach between the two factions of Irish sympathizers among the delegates were being made today at the opening of the second session of the forty-first annual convention of the American Federation of Labor.

Advocates of Irish freedom, it was learned, at a mass-meeting last night appointed a committee which was attempting to draft a resolution that would be satisfactory to both the extreme and conservative groups of the assemblage.

When this committee started to work, T. J. Vind, of Chicago, secretary of the Labor Bureau of the American Commission for Irish Independence, served notice that two "official resolutions of the Irish Republic" must be incorporated in their resolution, or he would act independently in presenting the documents to the convention.

The "official resolutions" called for a boycott, not only on British-made goods, but on all products made by English capital, and the boycott of British insurance companies and similar business organizations. They also provided that the executive council of the federation shall immediately compile a list of English-made goods and firms by British capital and send it to every one of the members of organized labor in the United States. Appointment of a committee of three by the federation to co-operate with the British trade unions to bring pressure to bear on the English Government to recognize Ireland and withdraw troops from the country also was asked.

Mr. Vind declared that the resolutions were drawn by "high officials of the Irish republic," but declined to state whether Eamon de Valera, "President of the Irish republic," had taken part in their drawing.

A large number of the delegates have

announced opposition to the official resolutions, and have presented to the committee a resolution demanding recognition of the Irish by the United States, withdrawal of British troops from Ireland, and repayment by England of the \$9,000,000,000 lent by the United States. Four other resolutions of similar character also have been submitted.

Despite the protest of supporters of the "official resolutions," Irish sympathizers at the mass-meeting declined to substitute them for all other resolutions.

Besides the introduction of resolutions, the only order of business before the convention was the address of the fraternal delegates from the British Trade Union Congress—J. H. Thomas, president of the British Railway Workers' Union, and W. Walker, president of the Steel Smelters' Union.

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SIX MOTORISTS INJURED

Rescuers Cut Away Front of Machine Wrecked on Ocean City Bridge

Atlantic City, June 14.—Rescuers were forced to cut away the front of an automobile to rescue Fred Harris, of Thirty-ninth and Cooper streets, Camden, early yesterday when a machine in which he was riding with Charles Greene, of Torresdale, Pa., collided with a bridge beam and upset on the new Absecon boulevard Sunday Point. Harris' legs were showed through the dashboard, but he was not badly hurt. Greene was painfully bruised and cut about the arms.

Four persons were injured in a crash on the new Absecon boulevard last midnight when a machine overturned four miles out from this city. All were brought to the City Hospital for treatment.

Boston Man Slain by Polish Rebels

Berlin, June 14.—(By A. P.)—Louis Snyder, of Boston, was beaten to death by Polish insurgents near Myslowitz, Upper Silesia, May 27, according to Karl Born, a Hamburg machinist, who escaped from that region a week ago and arrived here today.
