

**FIREMAN RISKS LIFE TO SAVE CHILDREN**

Leaps From Truck and Stops Runaway Horse Bearing Down on Group

**DRAGGED AND BRUISED**

Frank Matuso, hoseman of firetruck No. 11, put his own life in peril last night in stopping a frightened runaway horse from bearing down on a dozen children playing ring-around-the-rosie. The heroic work of the hoseman brought him commendation today from his superiors and fellow-firemen. Matuso was badly bruised.

The truck was returning to its station, Fourth street and Snyder avenue, from a local fire. The team, belonging to a teamster of 919 Snyder avenue, was standing near Fourth and McKean streets.

The horse became frightened at the clanging of the firebell and darted south on Fourth street. The children were playing in the street near Mercy street.

The scared animal bore down at a terrific pace. Onlooking women and men screamed a warning to the children, who were too enraptured in their play to pay heed.

Matuso, noting the danger of the children, darted from the running board of the fire truck and luckily caught the bridle of the horse.

The fireman was dragged fifty feet before the animal stopped. Had not the fireman taken this chance the horse and wagon would have run down the children.

The children observing their own narrow escape gave three lusty cheers for the heroic fireman.

**WM. PERRINE LEFT \$111,356**

Inventory of Editor's Estate Filed. Wills Admitted to Probate.

An inventory was filed today with Register Sheehan of the personal estate of William Perrine, who was editor-in-chief of the Evening Bulletin. The total was \$111,356, including \$31,000 Liberty bonds and 140 shares of Pennsylvania Railroad stock valued at present quotations at \$33,605.

Short, George H. Weverman, of 2003 Ontario street, willed \$23,300 to relatives.

Letters of administration were granted in the estate of Lewis Dringer, 2241 South Ninth street, \$500 to \$10,000.
