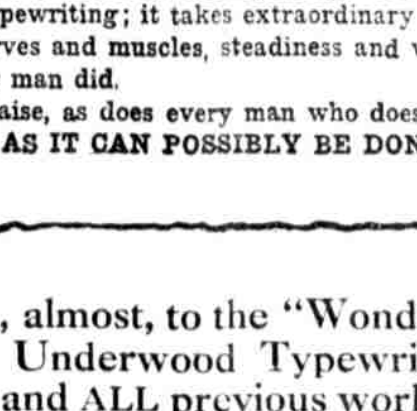
Among these are statements that the British are mixing wines with the medicines issued at the public dispensaries, and are using pork fat in certain manufatures.
