Sudden Death.—On Friday morning last, Albert Souder a son of Henry Souder of Fishing Creek, died very suddenly at his sisters in Marysville. From what we learn he had made the fire about 4 o'clock and called his sister up to get breakfast intending to go away. When breakfast was ready he did not make his appearance and going to call him his sister found that Albert had fallen over on the side of the bed and was dead. He had not been in very good health for sometime past, though the night previous, he seemed as well as usual. The deceased was a young man about 20 years of age.

The Pennsylvania railroad company recently introduced water troughs at one or two places on the line of their road near Derry and Johnstown, similar to those in use on several of the principal railroads in England. These troughs are eighteen inches wide, six inches deep, fifteen hundred feet long and are kept full of water. When the locomotive reaches the trough, the fireman quickly lowers a spout communicating with the water tank in the tender; the water is forced through by the speed of the train, and ere the trough is passed there is enough water shipped for the use of the boiler to last several hours. It is calculated that 2,200 gallons of water can be drawn up at each trough. The object is to save time, the intention being to run the fastest train from Harrisburg to Pittsburg with but one stop—at Altoona, and so on the return.

Man Killed.—An unknown man was literally cut to pieces at the East End of the Tunnel, on Monday last, by being knocked down and run over by one of the pushers running between this place Galitzin. His body was brought to the "dead house," at this place, and a coroner's inquest held on Tuesday morning, rendering a verdict in accordance with the above facts. From what we can learn, there was nothing whatever found upon his person by means of which he could be identified. His remains were properly cared for by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.—Altoona Tribune.

Arrested for Murder and Forgery.—On Monday of last week, the following charge was made against Thos. J. Boyer: PERRY COUNTY, SS.

Personally appeared before me, this 12th day of December, 1870, B. P. McINTIRE, Esq., of Bloomfield borough, Perry county, Pennsylvania, who after being duly sworn according to law, saith that on Saturday morning about three o'clock, the 3rd day of December, A. D., 1870, the house belonging to John P. Boyer, of Juniata township, Perry county, Pa., was burnt down by fire, and consumed the bodies of the said John P. Boyer, and Jane Ann Boyer his wife, and two children Elizabeth Boyer and John Boyer. The report of the Coroner's Inquest, says that their death was caused by Chloroform, or some other poisonous substance being administered unto them, and the dwelling house set on fire by some person or persons to them unknown. From all the circumstances therein connected, and from the facts made known to deponent, of the calamity, he has good reason to believe that Thomas J. Boyer, of Perry county, Pa., (a son of the said John P. Boyer,) caused the death as aforesaid, of the said John P. Boyer, Jane Ann Boyer, Elizabeth Boyer, and John Boyer, and then set fire to the aforesaid dwelling house, and consumed their bodies so as to conceal the heinous crime of murder.

And further, the deponent believes that the said Thomas J. Boyer committed Forgery by signing the name of Wilson Darlington to a Promissory Judgment Note, dated the 15th day of August, A. D., 1870, for the sum of forty-five dollars. The said note was made payable to A. L. Whitekettle. The deponent further believes that the said Thomas J. Boyer signed the name of John P. Boyer to two notes given to "The Perry County Bank," one for the sum of two hundred dollars, the other for the sum of one hundred dollars, also, that the said Thomas J. Boyer signed the name of John P. Boyer to a note given to Wilson Darlington and A. B. Clouser, for one hundred and twenty-five dollars. The deponent believes that the signatures of John P. Boyer to the aforesaid notes are not genuine, but that Thomas J. Boyer committed Forgery by signing the name of John P. Boyer to those notes, and further saith not.

A warrant for Boyer's arrest was issued by J. R. Shuler, Esq., and placed in the hands of the Sheriff and on Tuesday forenoon the accused was lodged in jail to await his trial on the charges of murder, arson and forgery.

We hope for the credit of humanity that Boyer will be enabled to prove his innocence of the charges of murder and arson, for if all the crimes should prove true, it will be the worst criminal case on record.

A Good Speculation.—The Lewistown Democrat says:—Sheriff Jones a few years ago bought a farm in Perry county, near the Millerstown Station, for \$14,000. Several rich veins of iron ore having been discovered upon the farm, he was lately offered \$11,000 for his bargain; but this he declined. He has lately entered into an agreement with an eastern firm, who obligate themselves to work the ore banks, and pay him fifty cents per ton for the ore taken away; and, moreover, to take away at least 100 tons per month. A pretty good farm, that, yielding \$50 in cash per month, besides the usual crops. However, the sheriff is a clever fellow, and everybody who knows him will be glad to hear of his good fortune.

Acquitted.—The charge made against Dr. J. H. Case, of this county, which was tried last week in the Juniata county Court, was shown to be only a base attempt to "black mail." The woman who brought the charge was proved to be entirely unworthy of belief and the failure to make out the charge was so plain that according to the Independent, Judge Graham used the following language in his charge to the Jury:

"We might as well investigate the amours of a pig-sty, or determine the paternity of a litter of pigs, as ascertain who is the father of this child." The defendant was acquitted.
