GEORGE LOHMAN'S SUICIDE.

The Well known Wilkes-Barre Restaurant Keeper Drowns Himself in a Pond on the Kingston Estate.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Jan. 20.--Doubtful if it is the community at large ever saw a greater shock than when the news of George Lohman's suicide yesterday morning that George Lohman, the East Market street restaurant proprietor, had taken his own life by drowning himself in one of the ponds here in the morning...

They got a pole with a hook attached to it and held around in the water and were seen repeatedly by bringing to the surface the body of a man, which one of their number recognized at once as George Lohman, of East Market street.

His Mind Was Troubled. It is the prevailing impression that Lohman must have been temporarily insane when he committed suicide. He was seen acting for a day or two prior to his death as strange; he was very reticent and appeared to be brooding deeply over some matter.
