BUFFETTED BY ANGRY ELEMENTS.

Rails and Deck Fixtures of the Steamer Virginia Swept Away. NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—The staunch Union liner Virginia, which arrived last night had particularly boisterous passage from Liverpool bringing six raring days buffeted about by force and racing gales and high cross seas.
