STROUDSBURG, Jan. 10.—Two men who were looking at a switch on the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad, in East Stroudsburg, were arrested by an employe of the company and taken before Squire H. S. Drayton Tuesday afternoon.

Mrs. William Rafferty died suddenly at the home of her son-in-law, B. F. Morley, editor of the Monroe Democrat. She had been out during the day visiting friends, and upon returning home in the evening dropped dead immediately upon entering the house with heart failure.

Mrs. Davies was born in Breckinshire, Wales, 1835, and came to this country at the age of 14 years. When the war for the freedom of the slaves from their shackles broke out Mr. Davies was one of the first to enlist, of course, with the north. He enlisted in the One Hundred and Thirty second regiment of Pennsylvania Volunteers, and in it did heroic and gallant service for his country, participating in some of the greatest campaigns for a period of three years.
