Warranto. That board of directors continued to act until last Tuesday night when a meeting of the stockholders was held and it was decided to abolish the weekly meeting and vest the active control of the club in a board of managing directors who should meet weekly, the association thereafter to meet once a month, when the board of directors would make a report to it. The new board of directors consists of W. A. St. John, William Betts, E. R. Robinson, Patrick Jordan, jr., and

Alexander McKee. A. L. Martin, one of the directors whom the action Tuesday night left out in the cold, was incensed when he learned what had been done and yester-day he formally notified President St. John that he is a member of the legally elected board of directors and proposes to exercise the duties of his office until his term expires, Sept. 9 next. Mr. St. John told Mr. Martin that he would recognize as the board of directors the gentlemen elected last Tuesday, and Fir.
