IMPEACHMENT—GRANT'S TESTIMONY.—It was with some difficulty the General was brought to the stand, [of the impeachment committee,] believing, it is said, that some effort would be made to draw from him his political views. After a week's delay, the General was sworn, and testified that he was consulted by President Lincoln on the subject of restoring the State of North Carolina to her former relations to the Union; that Mr. Lincoln read to him a proclamation he had prepared on the subject, and that the proclamation issued by President Johnson relative to the State of North Carolina was identical the same as the one which Mr. Lincoln had read to him just prior to his death. This becomes important, in view of the fact that the advocates of impeachment rest their case principally upon the policy of the President in restoring the Southern States. The Judiciary Committee, it is understood, stand five to four against impeachment, and the majority report will be made by the Chairman, Hon. James Wilson, of Iowa.

[Washington Letter in Boston Post.]

TRADE AT THE SOUTH.—There is much depression in trade circles at the South. A correspondent at Memphis writes: "There is much dependency in mercantile circles, over the low prices, which will not be sufficient to pay the tax and cost of producing. Many predict harder times in the South next year than ever before experienced. There will be little cotton raised, unless Congress removes the tax. The impression here is that the present low prices are caused, to some extent, by a movement in New York and Liverpool, to work upon the necessities of the Southern people."

BUSINESS IN NEW YORK.—The Herald, of Monday last, says: "Business is exceedingly dull at present in the city. A prominent firm doing business as machinists on Railroad Avenue have been obliged, owing to the state of trade, to discharge for the present all of their workmen, with the exception of two, and it is their intention to close their shop entirely for one or two months. In other factories in the city the same expedient has been adopted, and it is feared that a general stagnation is to follow."

THE PROVINCES GOOD.—The Episcopal Bishop of Rhode Island recently preached a missionary sermon in London, in the course of which he said: He was sure he should not appeal in vain for that aid and sympathy in behalf of the Southern provinces of the United States which his Right Reverend brother had in the morning invoked for the Northern.

INDIANA DROPS THE NEGRO.—An Indiana correspondent of the New York Tribune says that the project of calling an extra session of the Legislature, for the purpose of passing a universal suffrage amendment, has been finally dropped, "after the unfortunate results of the same experiment in Ohio."

Joseph Dion, billiard champion of America, has challenged John Roberts, the English champion, to play three games—English, French and American—for \$10,000, in gold, each, and the championship of the world.

The Spanish Government offers to Louis Napoleon its assistance in the support of the Temporal Power. It must have a presentment that the present dynasty of Spain is not likely to survive long the downfall of the States of the Church.

A SAD CALAMITY.—On Monday last, the dwelling house of Mr. Alexander Monroe, about six miles above Camden, was destroyed by fire. None of the family were at home at the time, and everything he possessed was burned.—Camden Journal.

It is understood that the purpose of the visit of General Beauregard to the President and General Grant was to have restored to him certain lands which he owns near Memphis, and which are now occupied by the Freedmen's Bureau officers.

The cost of the proposed East River bridge between New York and Brooklyn is estimated at \$6,675,537.

Hotels, and even families, can discharge their duty if they would save, and send to the Work Rooms, such scraps of Bread and Meat as might be left at their tables. Those who do this, or otherwise aid our institution in preventing street begging, are earnestly requested not to give to persons at their doors, unless in exchange for something they may have to sell, but direct them to the Rooms, and oblige.

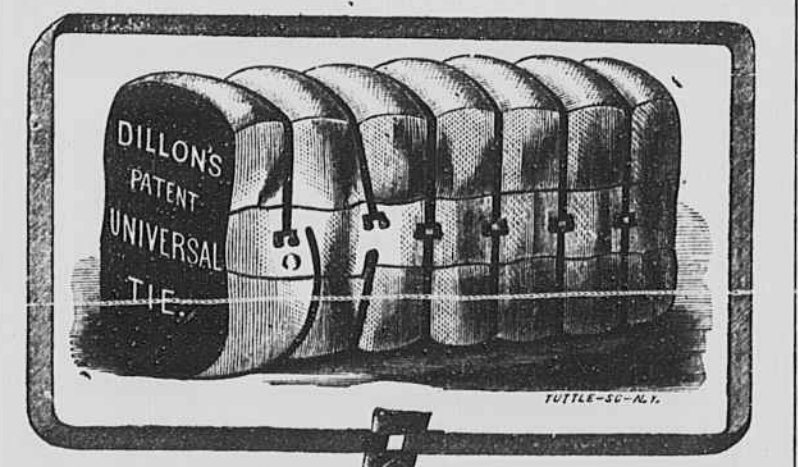

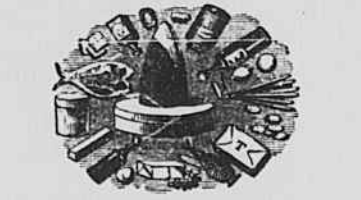
