

**ADDED TO PEABODY FACULTY.**

**Prof. W. K. Tate's Name Found Among the New Professors Named for the Peabody College for Teachers.**

Nashville, Tenn., March 5.—At the last meeting of the Trustees and President of George Peabody College for Teachers, just adjourned, nine new names were added to the faculty list, as follows: Carter Alexander, Ph.D., Professor of School Administration; Lula O. Andrews, A. M., Associate Professor of English; John Lee Coulter, Ph.D., Professor of Rural Economics; Kary C. Davis, Ph.D., Professor of Agriculture; Fletcher B. Dresslar, Ph.D., Professor of School Architecture and Hygiene; Charles E. Little, Ph.D., Professor of Latin; Robert W. Selvidge, A. M., Professor of Manual and Industrial Arts; Edward K. Strong, Jr., Ph.D., Professor of Psychology and the Psychology of Education; William K. Tate, A. M., Professor of Rural Education.

South Carolina citizens, including all educators and teachers, will be particularly interested in seeing on the list the name of Professor William K. Tate, of Columbia, S. C., who has been so successful as the State Supervisor of Rural Schools of South Carolina. In this position he has made a name for himself as well as for the State, because of the thoroughness and efficiency of the work he has done in building up the rural schools of the State.

Professor Tate is recognized as the Rural School specialist in the South, and this means the best in the entire country, if not in the whole world. Professor Tate was commissioned by the National Bureau of Education to make a special study of the schools in Switzerland. His report has attracted wide attention because of the wisdom with which he discriminated between the good and the bad points found in the Switzerland schools. The recommendations of his report have caused much discussion among American educators everywhere, and will cause many of the best features of the Switzerland system to be used in our American schools.

Professor Tate's other writings have been of a special character closely related to his special field of work. Some of these are "Suggested Solutions for Some Rural School Problems in South Carolina," "Teachers' Manual for the

**What Will the Suffragettes Do After They Stop Plying Torch?**

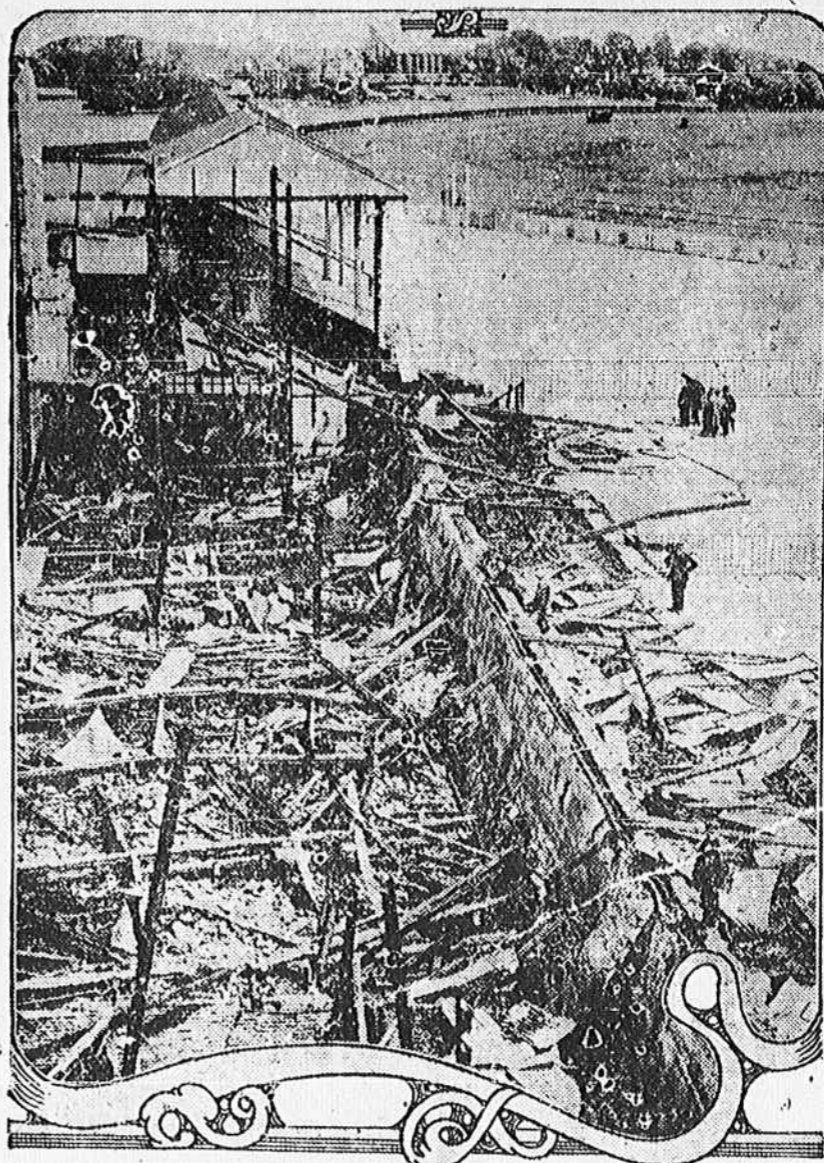
