ANOTHER CONVENTION.—From one of the most—if not the most—influential of the leaders of the Radical Republicans we learn that the Radicals intend, in the present campaign, to execute the following flank movement upon the National Union party. They propose shortly to hold a Convention at which a platform will be adopted offering to the South all that the Philadelphia Convention has offered, and in addition consenting to abrogate the Congressional test oath, and distinctly commit themselves to the admission of the Southern representatives without any reference to their antecedents; and for these concessions they ask the extension of the elective franchise to the negroes, under such restrictions and qualifications as are required in New York and other Northern States where the black population is enfranchised under certain limitations. This, while admitting the principle of negro suffrage, would be of little practical value to the freedmen for years to come, as very few of them could qualify for the franchise under any considerable restriction in regard to property. The Radicals claim that the best minds of the South favor this proposition, and regard it as the surest and speediest process for the political rehabilitation of their section. We simply suggest that if the Radicals and conservative Republicans, and in fact, all the political organizations of the North, are already bidding for Southern votes, there is a good hope that the South will soon get its own.—*New York News.*

**Finding the Stolen Jewelry.**

A New York correspondent of the Baltimore *Episcopal Methodist* writes to that paper:  
 "A Southern lady, on a visit to this city, went to worship in one of the up-town churches. Soon after, an elegantly-attired New York lady, of high social standing, entered the same pew and remained during the service; after which, the Southern lady called her aside into the vestry room, and, in the presence of the rector, with whom she was well acquainted, thus addressed her, 'Madam, I do not wish to offend you, but that shawl you are wearing belongs to me.'
