Campaign Draws Nearer Its Goal

TOTAL OF \$20,075 HAS BEEN SUBSCRIBED TO DATE—LAST DAY

93 SUBSCRIBERS

Have Contributed So Far—Strong Efforts to be Put Forth Today to Get Balance.

The teams in charge of the campaign to raise funds with which to pay off the indebtedness of St. John's Methodist church are gradually but surely drawing near the goal, the total amount subscribed to date being \$20,075.

Efforts will be redoubled today to raise the balance necessary to make up a sum sufficiently large to pay off the entire indebtedness. The net results of the campaign will be announced Sunday morning at St. John's Methodist church and it is confidently expected that the announcement that the full amount has been realized will be made.

This makes a total of 269 3-4 shares subscribed for to date, representing contributions of \$20,075. The total number of subscribers is 93 3-4.

SUMMER SCHOOL AT WINTHROP COLLEGE

Preparations Under Way for Large Attendance—Session Starts June 15.

Rock Hill, May 21.—Winthrop college is preparing for an unusually large attendance at her summer session June 15th to July 23rd. The college has been laying in provisions and the farm of 14 acres will have its capacity tested. A recent visit to the dining room and kitchen brought out the fact that it is a gigantic task to provide for the college girls in the regular session, and the summer school teachers will demand as much at present. For the regular session in one day three barrels of flour are consumed, 540 loaves of bread are necessary for the day; 125 pounds of sugar per day. For breakfast 1,000 eggs must be scrambled to give each student a good helping; six bushels of potatoes are peeled in the "patent" peeler for each meal that has potatoes on the menu card; 240 pounds of ham are boiled and sliced for one meal; 125 nice fat hens have to be brought from the college poultry plant, dressed and baked for Sunday dinner each week; 255 pounds of tender steak from cattle bought by the superintendent of the college farm, fattened and butchered there and brought to the college, is consumed at one breakfast; 20 pecks of green peas are necessary for one dinner. From 175 to 200 quarts of strawberries from the Winthrop college farm are eaten at one meal in the dining room, and it takes 50 gallons of ice cream made by the electric freezer to serve the Winthrop college students one time. This is for 870 people who eat three times per day in the Winthrop college dining hall, and nearly the same amount is planned for each day of the summer school.

Pocket Periscope for Use in the Trenches.

With a new pocket periscope that has just been brought out in England it is possible for a soldier to look over the parapet of the trench without exposing himself to the fire of the enemy. The periscope is simple in construction, consisting only of two mirrors connected by a collapsible framework. Both mirrors are fixed to the framework at an angle of 45 degrees. When the framework is extended and the upper mirror is raised above the trench, the view is reflected by the upper mirror down to the lower one, which reflects the light rays horizontally to the eyes of the observer. The June Popular Mechanics magazine contains a picture of the device.
