The State Convention.
COLUMBIA, September 26.
In the Convention, to-day, the Revising Committee on the Constitution reported back the same, with some slight amendments; which was passed.

The question of giving the veto to the Governor was reconsidered, and a clause to the Constitution was added, giving him a qualified power in that respect; which was sent to the Engrossing Committee.

Charleston District, outside of the Parishes of St. Philip and St. Michael, is to be called the Berkeley Election District.

TWO DAYS LATER FROM NEW YORK.

Arrival of the Steamship Quaker City.

The Quaker City, from New York, which port she left on Saturday last, at 6 P. M., arrived off this bar yesterday afternoon, but did not reach her anchorage until midnight, in consequence of low tide. We are indebted to Purser FREDERICK W. ELY for New York papers, from which we make some extracts. The following are the principal items of

NEWS.

The steamship *New York*, from Aspinwall, arrived at New York on Saturday forenoon, bringing \$1,088,877.02.

The steamship *Kangaroo*, from Liverpool, was below New York on Saturday, P. M., the 23d.

The following South Carolinians have been pardoned by the President: SAMUEL J. TOWNSEND, L. C. MOWRY, W. S. MOWRY, JOHN McQUEEN, R. C. ESMANUEL, E. W. EDDINGTON, and CHARLES FARHAR.

General Lee's application for pardon having been indorsed by the Lieutenant-General, will doubtless, be speedily granted.

The trial of Wenz still continues at Washington, and two of the physicians employed there had given valuable testimony. They attributed the great mortality to the crowded state of the pen, the absence of proper food and medicine and all facilities for cleanliness, want of wood, water, clothing, and of shelter from heat and cold, and the filthy and poisonous condition of the prison.

Bishop Meade, of Virginia, in his address to the Episcopal Convention of the State, now in session at Richmond, has strongly urged reunion with the Northern wing of the Church. The committee appointed to consider the portion of the address referring to this matter presented a report, which was almost unanimously adopted by the Convention, commending the conciliatory and fraternal course proposed, and referring the subject to the next General Council.

The French steam corvette *Roland* arrived in New York on Friday from Sydney, Cape Breton, making five French war vessels now in port.

The steamship *Colorado*, which sailed from San Francisco for Panama on Monday last, carried two million and twenty thousand dollars in gold, of which one million three hundred and fifty thousand is for New York.

The American Institute Fair building, in Fourteenth-street, was crowded last night with visitors, among whom was General Hooker, who divided with the articles regularly on exhibition the interest of the mass of spectators. He was followed in his tour of inspection by the crowd, who insisted on an address. Finally the General yielded to their demands, and made a brief but good humored speech. Subsequently he was entertained at a collation in one of the committee rooms, where he made another short address.

The European capitalists spent Friday, 22d, in viewing the objects of interest at and in the vicinity of Niagara Falls. At night the falls were illuminated in honor of their visit; there was a display of fireworks, and the distinguished party were entertained at a banquet at the International Hotel.

One of the Chicago theatres, known as the Museum, was on the evening of the 19th inst. the scene of a tragedy more genuine than those usually represented on the stage. George B. Beach, one of the actors, twenty-seven years of age, was shot in the green-room by his wife, a young and beautiful woman, aged only eighteen. They had been married a little over a year, but separated soon after the wedding, on account of disagreements, and had lived very little together during all the time of their married life.

The husband had filed a bill for a divorce, and his wife insisted on his withdrawing it. This she could not induce him to do, and therefore determined to take his life. She did not fully succeed in her design, however, as the wound inflicted, though a severe one, was not considered necessarily mortal. She was arrested and committed, but seemed to have no compunctions regarding her bloody deed.

THE PACIFIC SQUADRON.
The iron-clad *Monadnock*, the steamer *Vanderbilt* and the screw steamer *Tuscarora*, will leave the North on the 1st of October for the Pacific. They are to be attached to the squadron on that coast. These vessels will be accompanied to their destination by Commodore John Rodgers, who is expected to be in command of the squadron. The market was more active and higher

at New York on the 22d. Governments were steady. Gold was steady, and closed at 143 1/2. There was a fair degree of activity in commercial circles at New York, on the 22d, and there was more buoyancy and firmness than for several days. Nearly all kinds of foreign goods were held higher, and, in some cases, altogether above the views of buyers. Groceries were steady. Cotton was unchanged. Petroleum was active. On Change flour and grain were higher. Pork was dull. Beef was active. Lard was higher. Whisky was firm.

PARDONS.
WASHINGTON, September 22.—The President to-day granted pardons to six Virginians and to ninety-three North Carolinians, including members of Congress Kenneth Layton and Alfred Dockery; also to seven South Carolinians, including ex-member of Congress John McQueen, and to the same number of Mississippians. The rush to the White House for pardons seems to gain a new impetus by each Cabinet day's delay, and to-morrow will probably eclipse all predecessors.
