Mr. J. Fred Meyers, editor of the Denison (Iowa) Review, has been taking in the beauties of our scenery, proving the excellence of our famous Hot Springs and having a good time generally for the past ten days. Mr. Meyers is editor and publisher of one of the ablest and most influential of the Iowa weekly papers. When he returns home, he will prepare an article descriptive of his trip to, and sojourn at this great resort. Knowing his ability so well, we are sure the famous Minnekahta waters, and the lovely surroundings will receive proper recognition at his hands. Mr. Meyers is a very pleasant gentleman, whom to know but casually, is to respect, and as the acquaintance becomes more intimate, respect grows into admiration for the man, who, while of foreign birth, is one of the most thorough and consistent Americans we ever met.

Lawrence Bruner, of Washington, D. C. has been putting in a few days this week about the Hot Springs searching for bugs with which to enlarge the collection at the Smithsonian Institute. He succeeded in finding four new varieties of grasshoppers and several small beetles, for which he could find no name. His principal business out in the Hills country is to ascertain the probabilities for a crop of migratory grasshoppers next year as usually in the mountainous regions west of the Missouri. Mr. Bruner is an exceedingly pleasant gentleman and in answer to our query about entomology, he imparted some very interesting information. Among the several scores of distinct varieties of grasshoppers, only four he informs us, are destructive to crops. Mr. Bruner is an enthusiast in his profession and we predict for him a bright future.

Last Wednesday the "big four" consisting of Gen. Burke, Col. Petty, Maj. Gillespie and the Star man (who has not yet earned a title) started out in the rain to capture a wild horse which belonged to the "Governor." The horse was in Gen. Burke's pasture on his ranch about eight miles, (the Gen. says it is only three miles) from town. Arriving on the ground, we surrounded the herd and drove it to the corral, but instead of going quietly as they should have done, the herd broke away and gave us a desperate chase. Col. Petty being the best mounted, finally succeeded in leading them off and the second attempt to corral them was successful. Then Col. Petty adjusted his lasso and commenced swinging it in a manner that would have frightened a tame cow. He is an artist at the business, however, and when he "let go" the lasso dropped neatly over the head of the wild horse who commenced a series of plunges and it took three of us to hold him. The Col. then adjusted a halter and the unwilling captive was brought to town and the next day shipped to Sioux City to work on a horse car. The Major concludes as the result of his experience on this trip that paper shoes and a hard riding horse on a rainy day tend to make a man do a heap of hard thinking.
