



The funeral of Sam White Bear, the first Pine Ridge Soldier to die in the service was held at Oglala on April 4th.

Word was received on April 10th of the death of Mrs. Charles Ghost Bear at Antiock Neb. The remains were brought to Pine Ridge where interment was made April 22. Mrs. Iron Horse the mother of the deceased contracted a cold during the trip from Rushville with the remains of her daughter and passed away on the morning of the 23rd.

Dr. Newberne made us an official visit during the latter part of April and the first of May. The doctor and the writer used to board at the same table in Manila in the early part of this century and as this was our first meeting since we enjoyed talking over old times.
